

PENNSYLVANIA WOMAN ELECTED HEAD OF D. A. R.

WASHINGTON, April 26.—Mrs. Anthony Wayne Cook of Pennsylvania was declared elected president-general of the Daughters of the American Revolution today after one of the bitterest election contests in the history of the society.

The vote for Mrs. Cook was 940. Her only opponent, Mrs. G. Wallace W. Hanger of Washington received a vote of 779.

The result of the balloting was announced when the annual congress renewed its session today in an atmosphere of almost feverish excitement. While the voting was in progress police and firemen had been called upon to help preserve order and when the result was made known, the congress went into a prolonged and noisy demonstration for the successful candidate.

Mrs. Thomas A. Edison of New Jersey was elected chaplain general by a vote of 871 to 746 over Mrs. Thettt Goode of Alabama, who was Mrs. Cooke's candidate. All the remainder of the Cook ticket was elected. The other successful candidates follow:

PAIR HANGED FOR CRIME FOR WHICH ONE TAKES BLAME

BUTTE, Mont., April 26.—Wm. and Monte Harris, convicted of the murder of Cyril Schilling, were hanged in the county jail building this morning. The trap was sprung at 3:08 a. m. and seven minutes later they were pronounced dead. On the gallows Monte Harris made a brief speech in which he declared he was going to his death an innocent man. William Harris in a statement given out before the execution said that Monte Harris was innocent of the crime and that he alone was responsible for the murder of Schilling. Yesterday afternoon the two expressed a desire to see a Catholic priest and early in the evening they were baptized and an hour before the execution received the last rites of the church.

In carrying out the execution Sheriff Dugan eliminated the use of the black cap over the faces of the men, the sheriff explaining that he did so for the purpose of avoiding even a minute's delay after the noose had been adjusted.

Ex-Mayor Schmitz of San Francisco Will Run Again

SAN FRANCISCO, April 26.—Eugene E. Schmitz, county supervisor and former mayor who was tried and convicted on a charge of accepting a bribe sixteen years ago while he was the city's chief executive, today announced that he would again run for mayor in the November election. James Rolph, the incumbent, has made no announcement, but is being urged by many friends to run again. The conviction of Schmitz was overturned by the district court of appeals on the ground that there were errors in the indictment.

POULTRY CLUB TO MEET TOMORROW
