CIGARET VICTIM WARNS CHILDREN LOCAL SCHOOLS

"Doc" Rutherford, globe trotter, soldier of fortune and lecturer, spoke six times in the county Monday and Tuesday under the auspices of the county Y. M. C. A. Mr. Rutherford comes here from a long lecture tour in California where he spoke in practically all the high and grade schools of the state. A physical wreck at the age of forty-six, he is giving his remaining strength to the task of warning young folks of the injurious effects of cigarette smoking, to which he attributes his present condition.

He points out how the habit lost him an education, a home, the privilege of fighting for his flag and country and has brought him to middle life broken in health and a verdict from different physicians of but a short time to live.

Mr. Rutherford says that the wide billboard advertising of tobacco is insidious propaganda on the part of two of the biggest corporations in the world to educate the youth to consume their product. He demonstrates the presence of certain poisons in cigarette wrappers and exhibits convincing statements from Thomas A. Edison, Henry Ford and others with regard to the effect of the cigarette on employees. He showed a long list of great firms who refuse to employ cigarette smokers.

Probably no speaker on a similar subject has ever had a more undivided attention on the part of the young folks. He gets his message across with a good sprinkling of wit and broad humor, but clinches his points without fail.

Mr. Rutherford spoke in Ashland in both Junior and Senior highs, in Talent, Phoenix, Central Point and Medford. The general holiday in the afternoon prevented his being used more extensively.

PARIS, April 19.—The French undertakers union has called a general strike throughout the country to support the wage demands of its members in the Paris suburbs, who for the past month have sought an increase of five francs a day. The city of Paris is not affected, as undertaking here is a municipal monopoly.

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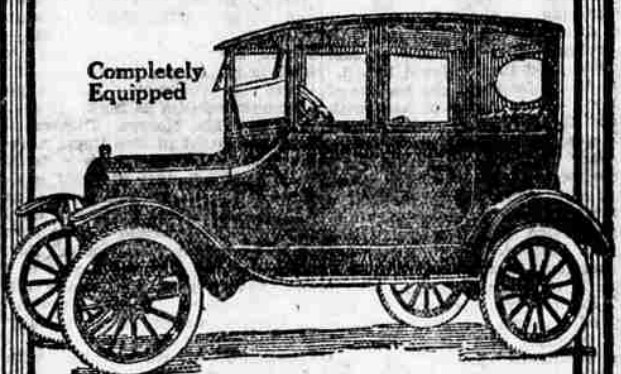
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
