HANSEN PLAN IS UPHELD BY COURT.

In an opinion handed down by Judge Harris of the supreme court, the Medford city charter known as the amended Hansen plan is declared valid and constitutional, and a previous decision of Judge Hamilton of Douglas county is sustained.

The case was taken to the Douglas county circuit court on an affidavit of prejudice filed against the then Judge F. M. Calkins.

The decision holds that the city has the right to issue assessment deeds for property sold for delinquent taxes.

The suit was filed by Earl H. Fehl, with R. F. Lindas acting as his attorney, while former City Attorney Fred Menz represented Medford.

REDUCE FREIGHT FOR SMELTERS OF IDAHO

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Smelters located at Kellogg, Idaho and Newport, Wash., should be given the same rates on their metallic products, the inter-state commerce commission held today when shipping to points east of the Mississippi that railroads allow to smelters located in Montana and Utah. Railroads were ordered to make reductions effective on or before July 11.

The commission held that notwithstanding the longer hauls to the east from Idaho and Washington plants, the "desirability of maintaining and further developing the output of Idaho mines, the long haul on the traffic, and the general tendency toward extensive groupings of many commodities for long hauls from this general western territory," all argue for the reductions ordered.

Commissioners Potter and Eastman, dissenting, declared the commission should not "deprive an industry of the advantage of its location by requiring removal of a natural disadvantage of a competitor at a carrier's expense."
