

ANOTHER BATCH OF SPEED VIOLATORS FINED IN COURT

The following list of offenders appeared before Justice Glenn O. Taylor yesterday and today as a result of the activity of deputy state motor vehicle inspector, J. J. McMahon and of Bert Ingram, new county traffic officer.

M. R. Colliard was arrested by county officer Ingram for speeding and fined \$10 on a plea of guilty.

A. F. W. Kresse was fined \$15 after having pleaded guilty to a charge of speeding preferred by deputy state motor vehicle inspector, J. J. McMahon.

H. V. Langhorne pleaded guilty to a charge of speeding and was fined \$10. The arrest was made by county officer Ingram.

E. W. Mueller, Jr., was arrested by deputy state motor vehicle inspector McMahon and had his driver's license suspended for 30 days.

Wm. von der Helten pleaded guilty to a charge of speeding and was fined \$10. The arrest was made by Ingram.

T. J. Coffman, arrested by Ingram for speeding was fined \$10 on a plea of guilty.

W. D. Reed was fined \$5, after having pleaded guilty to driving a car without license plates. The arrest was made by McMahon.

T. S. Johnson was fined \$10 when he pleaded guilty to a charge of driving a car without an operator's license.

McMahon stated this morning that drivers of motor vehicles under the Oregon state law must carry with them their driver's or operator's licenses at all times while driving any vehicle or be subject to arrest and fine.

GOLF TO BE TOPIC FORUM TOMORROW

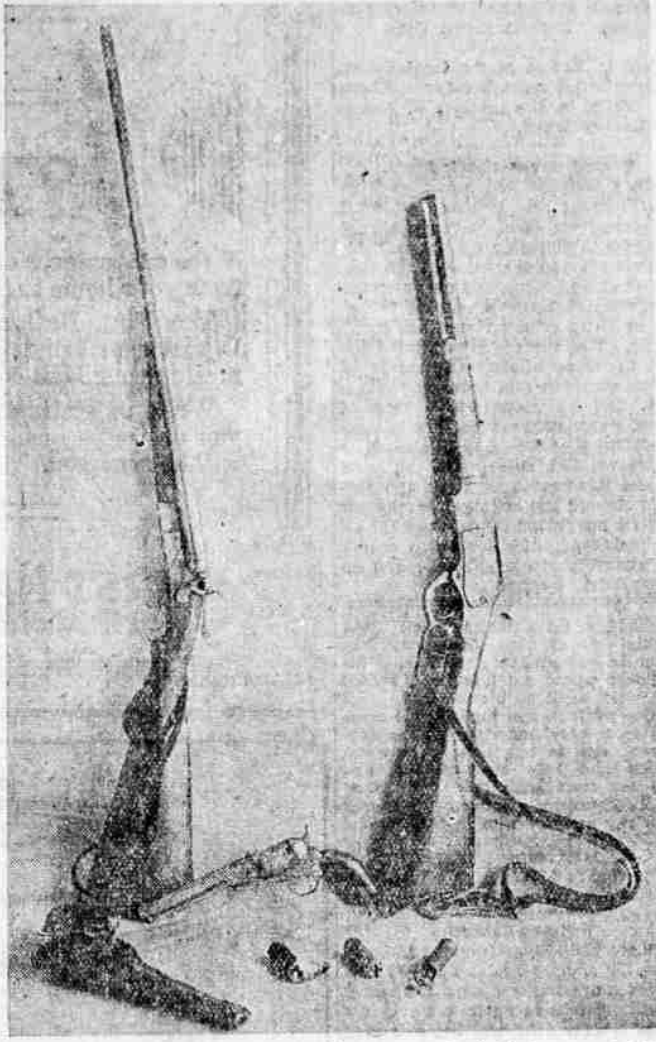

WEAPONS FOUND ON MOONSHINER ARE REMINDERS OF CUSTER'S LAST STAND



The accompanying picture shows a double barreled shotgun, 12 ga., and shells loaded with rifle slugs and buckshot, a Winchester sawed-off rifle and a Colt's cap-and-ball revolver of the vintage of Custer's last stand taken from the cabin of R. H. Price in a moonshine raid conducted on "the island" recently near Gold Hill by special prohibition officers Sanderfer and Leggett and a posse.

It is stated by the officers that Price had declared he would never be taken and that all the arms were loaded ready for use. They also declared that Price said when captured that he had come from West Virginia originally and had never done any-

thing to make a living except distill moonshine. Price was sentenced under the new anti-moonshine law to pay a fine of \$1500 and serve a year in jail for having made fit for distillation. O. Greer, an accomplice, was charged with possession of intoxicating liquor and was sentenced to six months in jail and to pay a \$500 fine. Both of the men pleaded guilty before Justice Glenn O. Taylor.

The pistol, taken by the officers is a curiosity being of an estimated age of more than 60 years and being yet in perfectly good working order. It is an old brass-mounted .31 calibre Colt's six-shooter, caps being used on the rear end of each chamber in the cylinder to detonate the charge.

TWO INDICTMENTS BY GRAND JURY

The grand jury which re-convened last week after a recess since February returned two secret indictments last evening at five o'clock for which two bench warrants were issued by Circuit Judge C. M. Thomas.

Following the issuing of the warrants the judge instructed the jury in their numerous duties and impressed upon them the importance and responsibility of their position. The charge was a strong one and the point that the law must be enforced in Jackson county was its key note.

Warning against unnecessary indictment and against laxity in cases where offenders should be indicted the judge advised the jury about some cases which would bear investigation.

"The grand jury is the supreme investigating body of this county," said Judge Thomas, "and its position is fully as important as that of any officer." Upon your shoulders lies the responsibility of law enforcement in Jackson county and if you fail to indict persons who should be indicted or indict persons who should not be indicted the act reflects on the county. Do what you think is right in any case that comes under your scrutiny. The law in Jackson county must be supreme, it is all that stands between the community and anarchy and will be enforced no matter whom it hits."

Although gold mining operations are still carried on in Scott valley, the Volt states: "The cultivation of the soil, stock raising, dairying, fruit growing, poultry raising, the production of garden truck—these are the activities through which this section of Siskiyou will eventually rise to the heights of permanent productivity and prosperity."

The issue contains a map of western Siskiyou county, California, showing the proximity of Scott valley to the new Klamath River highway, whose opening is announced as set for June 10, 11 and 12 at either Tea Bar or Orleans Bar on the Klamath river. The Volt urges everyone to be present at the dedication of this scenic route to the ocean.

"The road is said to be in fine condition," it continues, "and at the points where motor cars might experience difficulty in passing, guard duty will be maintained and traffic regulations adjusted so that all may travel in safety."
