In making my rounds last Monday I dropped into the Browns Bros. store and learned that D. E. I also noticed that they are getting a fine assortment of lumber, a very decided help to our little town. I also met Mr. Stacy who was ordering a lot of supplies to be used at the Chappell-Morgan sawmill near Trail where he was employed. There are now some four or five sawmills in that section of the country and I learned that there was a move on foot to put in another mill by one of the timber owners of Medford to cut up his timber into lumber to be used in his own yard. 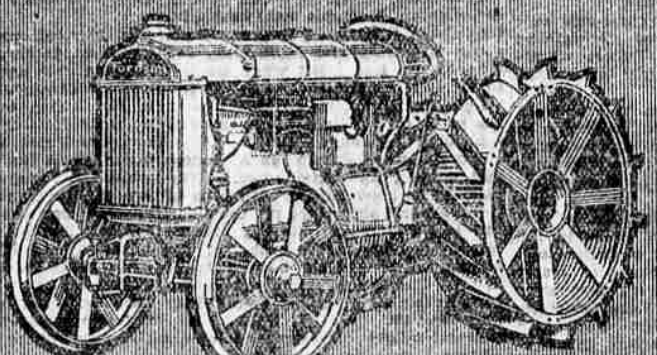

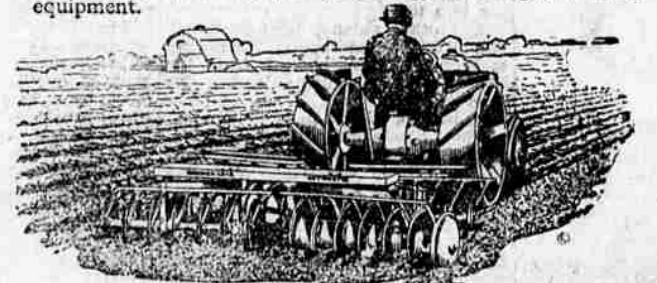
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
