

THIEVES RANSACK HIGH S. BUILDING, REWARD OFFERED

At a special meeting of the school board this morning it was voted to offer \$25 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who broke into the high school building last night and rifled practically all of the teacher's desks in the building.

Two weeks ago the building was entered and Superintendent Smith's office was ransacked but nothing of value was taken. Last night the same thing happened and in addition to Smith's office principal O. R. Campbell's office was gone through. One dollar and a quarter in cash was taken from Campbell's office. Teacher's desks were rifled and fountain pens and other small trinkets of little value were taken.

The board has decided to sift the thing to the bottom this time and special detectives are at work on the case. It is the belief of the teachers and school authorities that the theft was not committed by school students.

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TONIGHT IS PAY DAY NIGHT FOR LOCAL COMPANY

Tonight will be pay night again for Company A 188th Infantry, and every man will get his pay check for the first quarter's drill of 1923. It is a great satisfaction to the local Oregon National Guard company members to receive their pay checks every three months rather than semi-annually, as formerly was the rule. Grater attention is being paid now to the National Guard by the War Department, since the armory has been procured and actual construction work has been started, which will be pushed through to completion as fast as possible.

This building will give to the company a good military home and a safe place for government property, hence the government military department has sent to Medford a resident instructor from the regular army. Sergeant Vaughn has arrived in Medford and will make his permanent home here. His time and efforts will be spent in the furthering of the interest of the local National Guard company, and his headquarters will probably be at the Armory as soon as this building is completed.

The new rifle range near Jacksonville, which was approved by Adjutant General White on Sunday and Monday, will be put in shape at once for use. Through the efforts of the company with the assistance of the chamber of commerce of Jacksonville the range was procured, and the chamber of commerce of that city are taking immediate steps to have city water piped to the rifle range just outside of town. The range will be used not only for the company, but it is expected that the National Rifle association will also have the use of it.

The company is now preparing for the annual encampment at Camp Lewis, which extends from June 15th to June 30th, and this camp will be the most important one held by the troops as it will be an encampment of the entire 41st Division which takes in not only Oregon, but Montana and Idaho as well. One of the features at the camp will be the special attention paid by the military department to athletics. The principal drill period will probably be in the forenoon and considerable time throughout the entire camp will be turned over to the men for athletic work.

The Medford company will immediately recruit a few more young men to bring up to the required strength and is now especially working for young men interested in athletic work. The company expects to come home from camp this year with some of the prizes won from the entire 41st Division of the United States.

The Medford command will take with them this year a first class baseball team, fitted out with baseball uniforms, including caps, blouses, trousers, belts and stockings, which have already been purchased.

Within the next seven weeks several camps will be made by the local company on the rifle range at Jacksonville where active field work instructions will be carried on and regular guard duty as a part of the instructions before going to camp.

U. S. SUES TACOMA FOR \$232,398.40

TACOMA, April 25.—The United States government today filed suit in federal court here against the city of Tacoma for \$232,398.40, alleged to be due the United States shipping board for extensions and improvements on the municipal street railway during the war.

The suit, which is a bill in equity follows a demand of Mayor A. V. Fawcett that the government either cancel the debt or determine its status in court. City officials have taken the position that the money was advanced for war purposes to facilitate ship building operations and that it should be cancelled. The government suit asks the court to vest title to the car line in the government in case the money is not ordered paid.

DRY TOAST, OUT OF DINNER, WINS RACE

EPSOM, April 25.—(By Associated Press.) Dry toast, by Cicero, out of Dinner, owned by R. B. Bavinson, won the City and Suburban handicap of 1000 pounds with extras, run here today. Anthony DelRooschild's Roman Fiddle was second, and Mrs. A. Bendis's Conover third. Thirteen horses ran.

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VALUE OF GOLF AS AID TO HEALTH IS STRESSED BY EGAN

H. Chandler Egan was the principal speaker at the chamber of commerce forum luncheon at the Hotel Medford this noon at which Dr. R. W. Clancy was the chairman.

Mr. Egan delivered an exceedingly interesting talk on golf as a physical developer and outlined the local situation regarding the establishment of a golf club here within the near future. The financial phase of the proposition has been arranged by a number of local men, including several of the best business brains in the community in order to assure the success of the venture, declares Mr. Egan. The location of the course and numerous other details have not yet been definitely taken care of, however.

Golf, according to the speaker, is undoubtedly the most popular game in the United States today, being played by more people in all classes than any other game. It provides mental relaxation and an absorbing interest in addition to the exercise. For full benefit from any physical exercise a psychological state of relaxation and interest is absolutely essential, said the speaker.

"Golf provides the mental relaxation and physical exercise, obviously," said Mr. Egan, "and if you meet a golf enthusiast you won't have to talk with him very long until you will be convinced that he has an absorbing interest."

In substantiation of his statement that golf is conducive to health, the speaker cited several instances where persons given a limited time to live by physicians, took up golf and are still living, although the length of their lives had been set at but a few months ten and more years ago.

About twenty-three local men have guaranteed the funds necessary to establish a golf club in the Rogue river valley, but it is easily seen that this number cannot support the club. When the establishment of the club and the completion of the course is an absolute fact, however, Mr. Egan declares that he thinks the people of Medford and Jackson county will support the club and that a sufficient number of members for its successful progress will be secured.

Secretary Frohbach announced a special forum meeting next Saturday when members of the national organization of real estate dealers will visit Medford. Next week's forum will be held Tuesday noon instead of Wednesday as the speaker, Dr. Wirt, will be able to appear only at that time.

Wednesday night, May 2, a members' meeting will be held in the basement of the Hotel Medford. E. J. Adams, private secretary to U. S. Senator R. N. Stanford, will speak at this meeting.
