COAST HIT BY WALKOUT

The United States shipping board, however, said that so far as the shipping board is concerned, there is no strike here. There are five ships in the harbor, he reported, but beyond the usual shifting of crews there was no noticeable effect of the strike today. He said crews are easily obtainable here and that he didn't anticipate any difficulty in obtaining men for any places made vacant by the strike.

The waterfront was reported quiet here this morning.

NEW YORK, April 25.—While police today picketed the waterfront preserving the comparative quiet which ushered in the strike called by the marine transport workers' division of the I. W. W., officials of the organization, which claims 90,000 members, reported receiving messages from other seaport locals saying the strike was highly effective at Boston, San Pedro, Cal., Seattle, San Francisco, Portland, Ore., and New Orleans.

Members of the I. W. W. union at Baltimore were said at the national headquarters here to be ready for a general walkout tonight or tomorrow morning. In the first few hours today there was little evidence of the strike and a check up by police, shipers and rival union leaders, indicated only 300 of the transport workers' union had stopped work. The I. W. W. officials asserted, however, that the strike would effectively tie up shipping when it got under way.
