INDIANS' WINNING STREAK BROKEN BY DETROIT TIGERS

CHICAGO, April 25.—(By the Associated Press)—Ty Cobb's Detroit Tigers standing in the ninth inning of a wobbly game, broke the winning streak with which the Cleveland Indians began the season by taking yesterday's contest, 8 to 7.

The Chicago Cubs, who lost their first contest of the season to the Pittsburgh Pirates, ran their string up to 7 by trouncing St. Louis, 3 to 0, Aldridge holding the Cardinals to two hits.

Babe Ruth suited the second big occasion of this season by knocking a home run.

The Philadelphia Athletics defied a strong wind and defeated the Boston Red Sox, 7 to 3 and the St. Louis Browns won their second victory of the season 1 to 0 from the Chicago White Sox.

The New York Giants tried out two recruit pitchers and defeated the Brooklyn Robins, 6 to 4.

The Cincinnati Reds evened their series with the Pittsburgh Pirates and their standing in the National league by taking a heavy hitting game 5 to 4, while the Boston Braves and the Philadelphia Quakers were resting because of rain.

Frank Troch Is Champion.

CHICAGO, April 25.—Frank M. Troch of Vancouver, Wash., has the unusual distinction of being the amateur trap shooting champion in singles and doubles for 1922, it was announced at headquarters of the Amateur Trap Shooting association of America here today by Starr Matthews, secretary.

In winning the singles title, Mr. Matthews said, Troch established the greatest record in the history of trap shooting. His average for the season was .9828 per cent, a record by breaking 6158 targets out of 6260.

In the doubles the Vancouver marksman broke 1509 targets out of 1650 for an average of .9145 per cent.

Breaks Swimming Record.

MANILA, April 25.—(By the Associated Press)—Teofilo Idelfonso, 20

year old Filipino, today swam the 220 yard breast stroke with ten turns in a tank in two minutes and 56 seconds. This is said to break the world record made by Stephen Rudey of Chicago, April 6, 1921, when he covered the distance in three minutes flat. The occasion of Idelfonso's swim was a tryout for a team to enter the Far Eastern Olympic games at Osaka, Japan. Idelfonso is an enlisted man in the Philippine scouts.

Paddock Gets Okeh.

LOS ANGELES, April 25.—Chas. W. Paddock, world's champion sprinter, who is on the way to Paris to run in the international collegiate track and field championships May 1 to 6, will compete as a representative of the University of Southern California and has the university's permission to do so, the Trojan athletic board announced after hearing a message from New York quoting an unnamed member of the amateur athletic union as saying Paddock was likely to be declared a professional, and that he was to enter the Paris meet without U. S. C.'s approval.

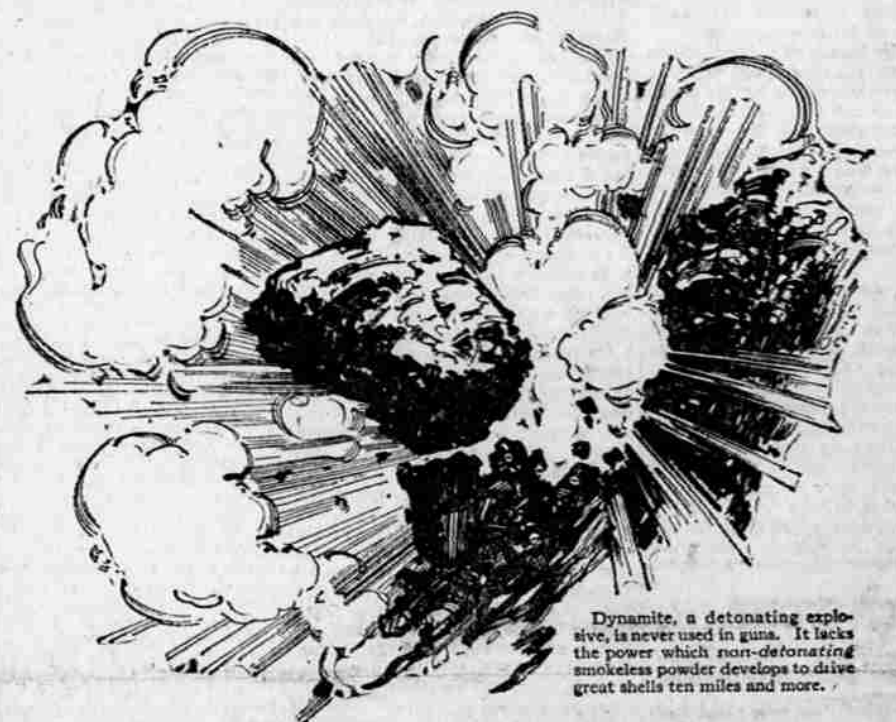

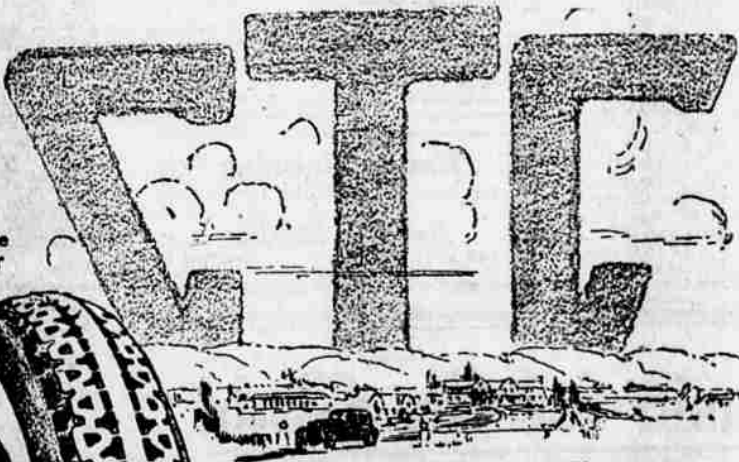
