TRIAL TOM WORD BRINGS OUT LARGE CROWD OF WOMEN

The work of selecting a jury in the Tom L. Word case began at 1:30 this afternoon, and the following six men were called to the jury box:

G. M. Mordoff, P. C. Bigham, E. D. Bradley, O. L. Harmon, F. L. Bennefield and Edward Lindberg.

The veniremen were questioned relative to their knowledge of the case, their views on prohibition, and if they had taken any "active interest" in the discussion of this community in the past year.

The case is expected to take all of today and part of tomorrow from present indications.

The trial of Tom L. Word, U. S. department of justice agent, identified last spring with the collecting of evidence in the Jackson county night-riding cases, was begun before Justice of the Peace Glenn O. Taylor this morning. Word is charged under a warrant issued on the eve of the night-riding trials last February with "being intoxicated in a public place," on November 22, 1922. An indictment alleging the same offense was returned ten days ago, by the grand jury now in session.

Word is defended by Chief Assistant United States District Attorney Thomas H. McGuire of Portland, acting under instructions from Attorney General Daugherty. The state is represented by District Attorney Rawles Moore.

The trial is being heard in the city hall, and among the spectators were a score of women, some of whom brought their needlework to court, to break the tedium of waiting for the proceedings to start.

The reason the government is furnishing counsel for Word, is that he is a government employee, and the alleged crime is said to have been committed while on governmental duty.

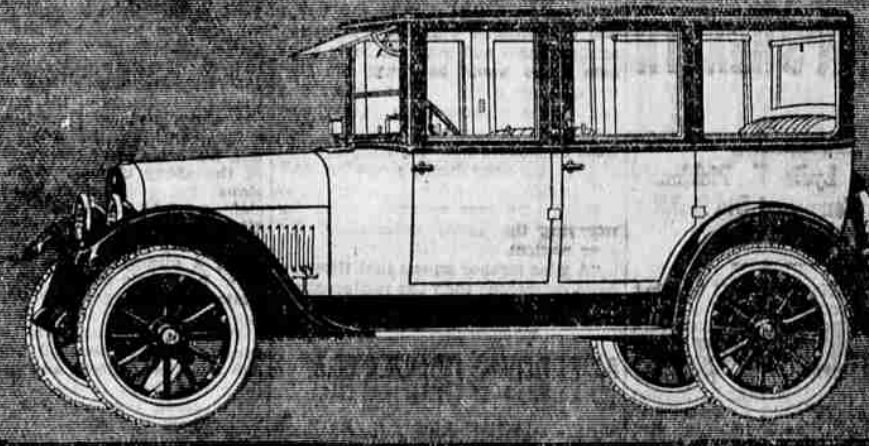
