

PROMINENT BOSTON MEN INDICTED IN BIG COPPER FRAUD

BOSTON, April 27.—William R. Allen, former lieutenant governor of Montana is named in a secret indictment returned by the county grand jury last week on a charge of defrauding stockholders in the Boston and Montana corporation and its subsidiaries. The other men indicted include George Gallup, former judge of the circuit court of Michigan and his son, Charles E. Gallup.

Others indicted are Charles L. Burrill, former state treasurer of Massachusetts and now a member of the governor's council; William Robert Montgomery, an officer of the American Discount corporation of this city; William Lee George, who is connected with the corporation; Hamilton B. Willis, broker of New York and Toronto; Harry G. Porch of Boston; Nathaniel E. Flanders of Boston; Samuel Usher, II, of Cambridge; William J. Burrows of Beverly; Francis Sullivan of Boston; Robert M. Currier of Westwood; Charles F. C. Cowdrey of Boston; H. Carleton Slack of the Boston stock brokerage firm of Allen-Slack company; Seth T. Gano of Boston and John H. Burnam of Boston.

The identity of the men named in the indictment was made known with the arraignment of the local men.

Allen is president of the Boston and Montana corporation and head of the Allen-Slack company. Burrill is president of the American Discount corporation.

Eleven of the men indicted pleaded not guilty when arraigned in the superior court today. Ten of them were released on their own recognizance in \$1,000 bonds, and one, Earl H. Montgomery was compelled to furnish \$10,000 bonds.

Counsel for the defendants asked for a speedy trial and at District Attorney O'Brien's suggestion the case was set for the week of May 7.

TO PROBE MOVIES FOR WILL HAYS

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., April 27.—Dr. F. D. McCluskey of the bureau of educational research of the University of Illinois today started a two months national investigation of visual education with the support of Will H. Hays, special commissioner of the motion picture producers. Mr. Hays recently gave the National Education \$5000 for research in visual education and \$2800 of that sum has been allocated to Dr. McCluskey for his work.

Dr. McCluskey will go to Washington, D. C., before mapping out his territory. He proposes to visit the centers where films and slides are made and study the problems connected with the work.

A report of the investigation will be made to the convention of the National Education association in Oakland, Cal., next July.

POLICE STOP DANCE AFTER 108TH HOUR

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Police interference was necessary yesterday to stay the feet of the last two survivors of Washington's dance marathon, who after a mysterious disappearance last night returned to a dance hall here and announced they were continuing unbroken the performance. They began Wednesday night. When the police broke up the dance, the couple declared they were completing their 108th hour and had made a new world's record.

The couple, Elsie Webber and William Farrell, both of Baltimore, had been taken to Maryland at midnight Saturday night to subvert the Sunday regulations in effect here.

HARDING'S NOMINATION IS DECLARED CERTAIN

WASHINGTON, April 27.—Thomas W. Miller, alien property custodian, after a conference today with President Harding issued a formal statement in which he said it was certain "that the republican party in the next national campaign will re-nominate President Harding."

Mr. Miller reported to the president on public opinion as he had found it during a month's trip through the west, but he said his statement as given out later had not been laid before the executive. Among matters on which he reported was understood to have been sentiment on the world court issue.

MYSTERY SURROUNDS MURDER OF HUSBAND

SPOKANE, April 27.—The hours' questioning of Mrs. Jack Richter and Matt Grubich, a neighbor and of deputy sheriff by Prosecuting Attorney Charles H. Leavy today failed

to shed any light on the shooting Saturday night of Richter at his home near Deer Park, northwest of this city. Neither the prosecuting attorney nor the deputy sheriffs would talk after the conferences.

Cumner A. G. Baker said the woman had claimed first that Grubich killed her husband and later said she herself had done it. Mrs. Richter and Grubich are being held in the county jail. Coroner Baker said he had not decided whether an inquest would be held or not. Richter had been shot twice.
