KEN WILLIAMS IS 1 HOME RUN AHEAD OF BAMBINO RUTH

NEW YORK, April 27.—An aggregate total of approximately 153,000 baseball fans witnessed yesterday the opening in six major league cities. Attendance honors went to Detroit where 35,000 persons saw the home team lose a hardfought contest to St. Louis, 4 to 3. Thirty thousand fans filled past the turnstiles in both the New York Giants and Chicago American ball grounds, while 22,000 including President and Mrs. Harding turned out at the Washington park.

Ken Williams contributed to the St. Louis team's victory over Detroit, by polling out his third homer of the season. He is one ahead of Babe Ruth.

At the Polo grounds a tremendous ovation was accorded Christy Mathewson, president of the Boston Braves. His charges, however, were beaten by the world champion Giants, 7 to 3.

The Boston Red Sox walked away with a 5 to 4 victory over the Yankees and skunked the New Yorkers to second place in the league standing.

Stanley Coveleskie's pitching carried his teammates to a 3 to 0 victory over the Chicago White Sox, and the Cleveland Indians again resumed the leadership in the league race.

Washington defeated the Athletics, 2 to 1.

Pittsburg scored its second successive victory over the Chicago Cubs, 7 to 2.

After six straight losses Brooklyn came to life and fell upon the Philadelphia pitchers, trimming the Quakers, 14 to 4.

William H. Crocker, national committeeman of California, is expected here Friday to confer with Fred U. Upham, treasurer of the republican national committee. San Francisco is offering \$250,000 as a pledge for the republican convention, Upham said, and might make a similar offer to the democrats.

ROTARY CLUBS TO ERECT MONUMENT OREGON-CAL. LINE

Some time in June the Rotary clubs of California and Oregon expect to meet at the California-Oregon boundary line to erect a suitable monument and the Medford Chamber of Commerce has been requested to advise the committee in charge as to local accommodations for the evening before and after the ceremony.

Delegations from San Francisco and central California, as well as delegations from the Rotary clubs of western Oregon, are expected to participate and the question of housing from two to three hundred people will necessarily be a serious one at that time of the year, due to the heavy tourist travel.

None of the details of the ceremony have been sent to the chamber, nor is there any mention made as to the character of the monument which will be erected, this information, however, will undoubtedly be forthcoming in a very short time.

ERUPTION OF MAUNA LOA PREDICTED BY OBSERVER

HONOLULU, April.—A new summit eruption of the intermittently active volcano of Mauna Loa before 1925 has been forecast by Thomas A.

Jagger, Jr., government volcanologist at the Kilauea observatory. Mauna Loa is on the island of Hawaii.

Dr. Jagger says that the Kilauea lava and that of Mauna Loa rise and fall in concert. Both volcanoes connect with the same underground course, the pulsations of which bring about a nine-year cycle of activities.

In connection with this forecast, Dr. Jagger urged the construction of a trail to Mauna Loa as a safeguard which would permit quick investigation of activities.

Mauna Loa's last great activity was in 1919, when the lava overflowed the crater and swept down to the sea thirty miles away.
