THE INCOME TAX.

EVERYONE agrees Oregon's greatest need is development. There can be no extensive development without capital.

Any movement therefore, that will encourage capital to come to this state, is a good movement for Oregon, and any movement that will send capital out of this state or away from it, is obviously a poor movement for Oregon.

At the recent session of the legislature a state income tax was passed. The Mail Tribune believes in a state income tax as a matter of economic theory, but it is opposed to a state tax at the present time, for one chief reason, namely:

That as long as no other state in the northwest or on the Pacific coast has an income tax, such a tax in Oregon will drive capital farther away from this state, and place another handicap on Oregon's development when she is now suffering a handicap which is almost insurmountable when successful competition with California and Washington is considered.

According to present plans there will be a referendum on the state income tax this fall. If such an election is called, we hope the state income tax will be defeated, for only through its defeat can Oregon be expected to hold her own in the industrial development which is sure to take place the next few years.

This country is now on the eve of another era of prosperity. All experts seem agreed that if the thing is not overdone, if over-inflation is avoided, there will be several years of steady and constructive development.

This means there will be considerable capital accumulated for investment. It is merely good common sense, which is only another name for good business sense, for Oregon to do everything in her power to attract her share of this capital to this state.

This can't be done if Oregon is advertised by her competitors, as she is already being advertised, as the only state on the coast which places a tax on incomes, particularly upon small incomes.

We repeat a state income tax is sound in theory. But it will be time enough for Oregon to have a state income tax when California and Washington take the lead. Oregon has been a political pioneer long enough. The time has come for her to pay a little more attention to her material interests.

UNCLE SAM TO PROBE KILLING

WASHINGTON, April 27.—Fred-erick M. Ryder, American consul at Vancouver, was instructed by Secretary Hughes today to investigate the firing on the American schooner Siloam by a Canadian Fisheries patrol, which resulted in the death of J. M. Yorke, a member of the Siloam's crew.

Consul Ryder telegraphed the department confirming reports that the

schooner had been fired on and said Yorke was "said to be an American citizen."

According to the report, the Siloam refused to stop at the first signal from the patrol vessel which then fired a solid shot into the craft. The Siloam was accused of poaching on prohibited fishing waters but until Counsel Ryder definitely establishes the facts, the state department will not decide what action should be taken.
