ADVANCE IN COPCO STOCK MONDAY

On Tuesday, May 1, the price of the preferred stock of the California Oregon Power company will be advanced. Considerably over half the issue has been sold to date at the present price of \$95.

Officials of the Copco organization state that the raise in price is necessary to maintain the stock at the price level of comparative hydro-electric securities elsewhere.

The income from the sale of preferred stock will be used to finance the additions and betterments to the company's properties in the territory served by its transmission lines.

Among the construction undertakings of the company, as announced in a letter to the stockholders this week, are:

The construction of a 66,000-volt transmission line in Klamath county, running from Algoma north to Chiloquin; the construction of a suction dredge to operate on Upper Klamath lake in connection with the lake regulation project of the company; the reconstruction of the transmission line from the Fall Creek Power House to Yreka, a distance of thirty-six miles; and the completion of a new line from Grants Pass to the quarry of the Beaver Portland Cement company at Wilderville, a distance of thirteen miles.

PROS. ATTY. MAY MOVE DISMISSAL OF WORD CHARGE

Shortly after the jury in justice court here yesterday afternoon brought in the verdict of not guilty against Tom Word, the department of justice agent, assistant United States Attorney Thos. Maguire, who defended Word at the hearing, accompanied by District Attorney Rawles Moore, left for Jacksonville with the intention of making a motion in circuit court before Judge Thomas to have the grand jury indictment, which was returned against Word by the grand jury for the same alleged offense, dismissed.

Attorney Maguire was unable to see the judge at once and after waiting for some time had to give up the errand, as he was compelled to depart for Portland on the early evening train to look after some matters there in United States court, prior to leaving for Klamath Falls where he will be engaged in a court case next week.

However, prior to departing, Mr. Maguire said that District Attorney Moore, after further carefully looking over all angles of the case would himself make the motion for dismissal in a day or so.

"I regret that I was unable to appear before Judge Thomas to make this motion myself," said the federal official. "The testimony given at the hearing against Word was so weak and unconvincing, based on conjecture and hearsay that any fair-minded person, as I view it, could see that there is no case as charged. This, together with other peculiar angles and the lapse of several months' time between the alleged offense and before the complaint was sworn out and served, and the fact that the prosecution brought out all its testimony at the justice court hearing, makes it seem absurd and useless to subject the taxpayers of Jackson county to further expense in bringing the same case to trial in the circuit court."
