Pilots for airplanes will be required to have drivers' licenses and each machine operating in the state will be given a license number as a result of an enforcement clause adopted at the state legislature regulating Oregon aeronautics.

Archie F. Roth, chairman of the state board of aeronautics, announces that the law would be in force at once and that all planes would be required to pass inspection at the hands of the board at stated intervals. All fliers will also be required to undergo a special medical examination. The pilot will be required to pay an application fee of \$5 and an additional license fee of \$10 and a plane license of \$10.
