ASHLAND COMPANY TO BUILD A RIFLE RANGE, BEAR CREEK

ASHLAND, April 29.—In readiness for some active practice before leaving for the annual military encampment at San Francisco, will be the status, as confidently expected, of the new rifle range which is being constructed in this vicinity. The site is across Bear creek. Three large well-defined targets will be available, and the range covers a distance of 1000 yards, the grounds being ideally located. The men of 484th company will perform the major portion of construction work following the surveys, thus acquiring further practical knowledge of field activities along various lines. Just at present the guardsmen are also perfecting themselves in athletics qualifying for a series of baseball games during the period before leaving for Fort Barry, near San Francisco scene of the Coast Artillery encampment, where the local boys of "484" will be assigned to handle the twelve-inch coast defense guns, a most important detail, and an appointment won undoubtedly by virtue of a meritorious record established upon other occasions in the expeditious handling of heavy artillery. The date of encampment for the south will be June 13, at which time four other state military contingents will be welcomed here for a stay of several hours, featuring maneuvers and enjoying the hospitalities of this city, an event which will rank as a holiday second only to a Fourth of July celebration in extent and importance.

On Tuesday evening there will be an illustrated lecture on gardening, under Civic Club auspices, at the community house, at which especially the man with the hoe is urgently invited to be present. The advantages of planting either in the dark or light of the moon may be dwelt upon.

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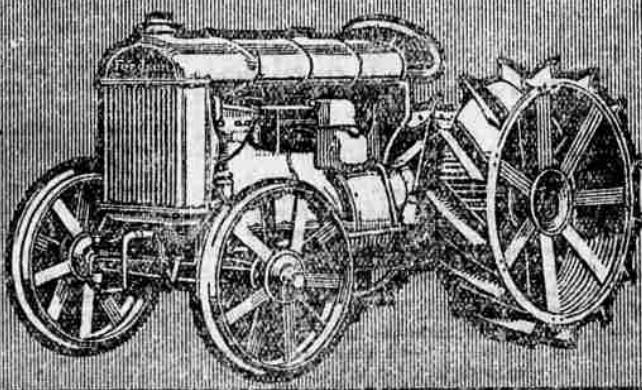

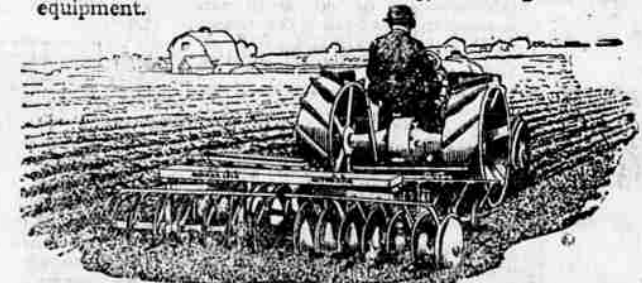
