

BELIEVE RABBI'S SLAYER FORMERLY LIVED IN TALENT

TALENT, April 28.—(Special to Tribune). G. G. Richardson, the ex-sailor who signed the written confession to the murder of Rabbi Alfred Lurie in San Francisco is believed by many to be Govan Richardson who was once a resident of Talent. Govan left here three years ago to join the navy only serving a short time before deserting. Since that time his people have never been able to locate him. His mother is now in California with her daughter. Govan is now 19 years old, the same age as the confessed slayer.

"BROKEN CHAINS"

DR. LINCOLN WIRT WILL GIVE TALK FORUM TUESDAY

Fresh from the Near East where he witnessed the horrors of war, famine, pestilence and massacre, Dr. Lincoln L. Wirt, international commissioner for the Near East conditions will arrive in Medford Tuesday, May 1st. He will speak at chamber of commerce luncheon Tuesday noon, and at the Presbyterian church Tuesday evening 8 p. m.

Dr. Wirt came direct to Oregon ten days ago from Cuba, and a few weeks before that visited South American points, China, Japan, New Zealand and Australia.

Dr. Wirt is reported to have a real practical message for every man, woman and child.

Rev. Lawrence of the Presbyterian church spoke today of Dr. Wirt as follows:

"We have made some inquiries here in reference to the impression the public in general has concerning the Near East conditions and invariably the people have a hazy conception of the present conditions and the territory in which those conditions exist.

"Few people have a clear concept of the Turkish danger zones, of the astute Turk, the Armenians, or Greeks. Politically, economically or spiritually they have either been over-rated or under-estimated, we think.

"Dr. Wirt, one of the best known Chautauqua lecturers and endorsed by the biggest men of the country will make clear to us the present prevailing conditions in this old, old land. He will give a travel lecture of unusual interest which Bishop Quayle says is absolutely 'without superior.' Dr. Wirt came into prominence in 1897 when he was sent to Alaska as school commissioner and has established public schools nearer the north pole than any other person.

"He spent three years in China, Japan, Philippines, Australia, South Sea Islands, Africa, Europe and Central America; was in the Great World War; visited the trenches, and in 1919 joined the relief expedition to Constantinople. Here and in Armenia, Syria and Palestine he helped care for 400,000 orphans.

"He is a great orator, has a great fund of humor, full of facts and from every viewpoint a delightful and thoroughly informed speaker."

strike situation in logging centers of Washington state remained virtually unchanged over the week-end, according to reports received by lumbermen here. Loggers who joined the walkout continued to arrive in Seattle yesterday and today, but there was no disorder and police said they expected none.

No reports of additional camps closing down were received today, and it was estimated that the number of men out remained in the neighborhood of 10,000. I. W. W. officials contended that 20,000 men had answered the strike call and that tomorrow, May day, every camp in the state would be closed.

Operators said they expected most of the camps to suspend operations tomorrow, but that the work would be resumed Wednesday.

A re-check of the log supply available for mills indicated a larger supply on hand than was first thought, it was said at the headquarters of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen here. Officials added that they expected no log shortage.

Few accessions to the ranks of the striking marine transport workers, called out by the I. W. W. were reported and shipping in this section was said to be unaffected.

Proprietors of a number of soft drink places here, ordered closed by strike leaders, appealed to the police for protection and were assured that they would be allowed to operate so long as they remained within the law. The order for closing said the strike leaders did not want the men to spend their money foolishly.
