CLAIMS DEMPSEY T. GIBBONS FIGHT IS NOW ASSURED

CHICAGO, May 1.—Jack Dempsey, world's champion heavyweight boxer, will grant Tom Gibbons of St. Paul, Minn., his long-sought championship bout next July 4 at Shelby, Mont., Loy Molumby, Montana state commander of the American Legion announced here last night. The battle will be fifteen rounds to a decision.

Molumby said that all that remained to be done is to sign articles and select a referee. He said that he and Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, who is in New York, reached an agreement in a two-hour long distance telephone conversation. It was learned a \$100,000 certified check will be given Dempsey when he signs and it was intimated Kearns assented to a plan permitting Dempsey either a straight guarantee or a percentage of the gate receipts.

LOS ANGELES, May 1.—Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion, who, according to Chicago and New York dispatches, probably will risk his title in a battle with Tom Gibbons of St. Paul at Shelby, Mont., July 4, was in good physical condition although a trifle overweight, according to his friends, when he left here two weeks ago for Helper, Utah.

He had been training for more than two weeks, each day going through heavy workouts with from three to five of the toughest sparring partners obtainable in Los Angeles and is said to be working out regularly at Helper. When Dempsey left here he weighed 193 pounds, five pounds above his best fighting weight, and was described as "hard as nails."

"I am in the best physical condition of my career," the champion said then. "I am only 28 years old and have no intention of retiring. I could enter the ring on short notice to meet anyone."

Raise Cash for Crews

SEATTLE, May 1.—The raising of \$12,000 to send the University of Washington varsity and freshmen crews to the national regatta at Poughkeepsie next month was begun today by a committee headed by Ward Kumm of the board of rowing stewards of the university. Mr. Kumm and five assistants were chosen last night at a meeting of the executive board of the University of Washington Alumni association.

The faculty has consented for the varsity to make the trip east, costing \$8,000, and has intimated that the freshman crew may go also if the people of the community show that they desire it.

Giants and Indians Lead

CHICAGO, May 1.—(By Associated Press). Sixth, seventh and eighth places in the National league standing and seventh and eighth places in the American league were unoccupied today.

The New York Giants had a clear two game lead in the National over Chicago and Cincinnati who were tied for second place, just a notch above Boston and Philadelphia, dwelling together in third position and crowded by Pittsburgh and St. Louis, who were knotted in fourth place. Brooklyn, with only three victories and nine defeats had a clear hold on the elevated cellar, fifth place.

In the American, Cleveland, by trimming the stubborn Detroit Tigers yesterday 4 to 2, through the invincibility of Stanley Coveleskie, kept a safe distance ahead of the New York Yankees who climbed back into second place by hammering three Washington pitchers while the Tigers bowed before the Indians.

The Athletics were a step behind the Tigers, beating Boston by timely hitting in the eleven innings, 4 to 2.

By vanquishing Chicago 7 to 3 with air tight fielding, St. Louis ascended into a triple tie with the Senators and Red Sox and put the White Sox deeper into the cellar.

The Yankees made the day memorable by cracking the Washington pitchers for seventeen hits which they converted into 17 runs to the Senators' four.

After dropping three straight the Giants defeated Brooklyn 4 to 3, while the Cubs went into second place with Cincinnati by falling before the Reds 6 to 4.

Boston battered a trio of Quaker pitchers getting fifteen hits and counting thirteen times to the Phillies' three.

Ray Blades, Cardinal left fielder, went into a triple tie with Ken Williams of the Browns and Hartnett of the Cubs with his fourth homer of the season, helping his team to a 7 to 5 victory over Pittsburgh.

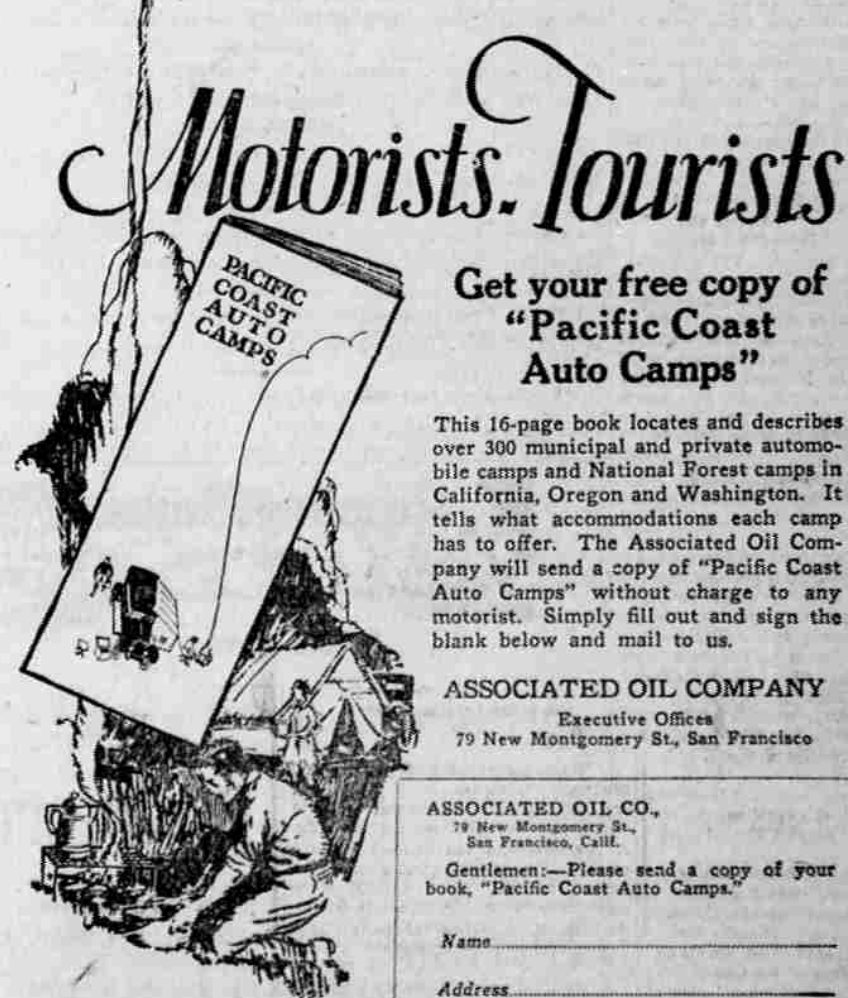
