

A THRILLING AIR STUNT CONTRACTED FOR 1923 FAIR

A most sensational aerial exhibition attraction was contracted for last evening by the directors of the Jackson county fair for the fair this fall.

There are four distinct features, the first one is known as the flying circus consisting of two planes. Every stunt with a plane is to be performed by these two flying together in close formation. Double parachute drop, man jumping from plane while plane is flying in an upside down position.

At night there will be an exhibition flight with plane illuminated with 150 electric lights, which will be flashed off and on at the will of the pilot.

Another feature of the exhibition will be the transferring of a man from a speeding automobile to a low flying plane. The auto carrying the man speeds around the race track, and the plane flying closely above follows the auto until the transfer of the man from the car to the plane by means of a short rope ladder is effected. This is a most thrilling stunt and is performed directly before the grand stand.

The fourth big feature act is the transferring of a man from one plane to another during a flight. The change is effected by both planes flying close together, one above the other until the man standing on the top of the wing of one plane grasps a rope ladder suspended from the other plane.

The contract price for this aerial exhibition is enormous, but the directors of the fair are determined to give the visitors to the fair this year their money's worth.

Addresses and songs including hymns which Roosevelt preferred, made up the programs.

MEDFORD BOOKLET TO BE DISCUSSED

One hundred and seventy-six ballots have been cast so far in the final election for directors of the Medford Chamber of Commerce and these members, who have not already voted and wish their ballots to be counted must bring them to the chamber of commerce headquarters before four o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

The names of the new directors will be announced at the big membership meeting tomorrow evening. This meeting will be held at seven-thirty in the basement hall of the Hotel Medford and E. J. Adams, private secretary of Senator Stanford will address the members.

The all-absorbing topic of publicity and publicity literature for Medford will come up for discussion. It is evident that a large majority of the members are convinced that this is the physiological time to issue a Medford booklet and provide funds for an advertising campaign for its distribution.

Publicity literature issued by other communities will be on display, as will be an exhibit of every booklet that has ever been issued by Medford.

HIGH SCHOOL PLAY TOMORROW NIGHT

"Stop Thief," a farce comedy, under the able direction of Miss Hertha Baumgartner, will be presented tomorrow night at the Page theatre by the senior class of the local high school.

The production, which has been presented by many famous companies, is said to be one of the most humorous, lively, fascinating farces ever staged.

Miss Baumgartner, director of last year's senior play, "Clarence," scored a remarkable success with the Booth Tarkington comedy and it is expected that this year's production will be as good, if not better.

A cast of excellent ability has been selected for "Stop Thief" and a capacity crowd is expected at the Page tomorrow evening. Seats are now on sale and are selling rapidly at the Page box-office.

DR. WIRT GIVES STRONG PLEA FOR A WORLD COURT

Dr. Lincoln Wirt, international commissioner for the Near East relief, was the principal speaker at the chamber of commerce forum luncheon at the Hotel Medford this noon, at which there was a capacity attendance. Dr. Wirt will deliver an address on the Near East at the Presbyterian church tonight.

One hundred and fifty thousand children of all ages up to 16 are now under the care of the Near East Relief, according to the speaker. During the last five years seventy-five million dollars have been spent by the Near East Relief. The books of the organization have been gone over by the federal auditors and the United States government states that only five per cent of the money spent during these five years has gone for administrative purposes. Ninety-five cents out of every dollar go to feed the hungry and clothe the naked, according to Dr. Wirt.

The influence of the American flag in the Near East and the respect shown it is greater than that shown toward any other nation. America has the chance to build up for herself there a prestige ten times greater than that of any other nation. The Near East, according to the speaker, is the most important part of the globe in that it is the key to the Dardanelles. Whoever holds control over the Dardanelles has a stranglehold on the food of the world, declared Dr. Wirt.

The Near East Relief intends to continue its great work as long as it is necessary to rear and educate the homeless, parentless children in its care. They will be given the same education that American children get. They are being taught by American men and women and when they grow able to take care of themselves will be the leaders in that important part of the world.

"Constantinople, a city of three million people, is without a sewer system," said the speaker. "Hundreds and thousands of girls, some of them even of the Russian nobility, degraded to a point where they can be bought body and soul for a sandwich or a cup of coffee, walk the streets. Even now these girls are being imported by their procurers to Europe and even to the United States. How do I know? I was in Cuba three weeks ago and a steamer with twenty of these girls aboard nearly landed and was prevented only by the fortunate action of the authorities. I'll wager they are safe ashore on this side by now."

"No barrier high enough or immigration ditch deep enough can be thrown around our country to bar the physical and moral disease that can come from this place. The spring must be cleaned at its source."

Dr. Wirt exposed some very interesting views regarding the international court immigration laws and the Chester concessions. "I want to see Uncle Sam with his strong arms and his clean heart and his reputation for a square deal sitting in an international court," said the speaker. "Other nations are so close to the Near East problem and are so affected by selfish ideals that they cannot see clearly. The United States with no selfish motive and with a long perspective, can look at the thing squarely. The influence of America is greater than that of any other nation. One crook of the finger of the American representative in an international court, would mean more than a regiment of soldiers of any other nation."

"I am glad to read in a paper I picked up this morning of the final consummation of the Chester concessions. It means that four hundred million dollars of American money will be spent in the Near East, hospitals will be built, educational institutions erected and the people benefited."

STRIKING TEAMSTERS GET WAGE INCREASE

SAN FRANCISCO, May 1.—A "progressive" strike of teamsters here for a fifty cents a day wage increase ended today with the granting of the increase by the employers. It was announced by union officials. The increase had been authorized by the impartial wage board, formed by certain business interests of the city to arbitrate wage differences.

Only a few men were called out yesterday, it being the plan to gradually call out more men until all were on strike or until the employers had granted the wage increase.

George M. Pope of New York, manager of the firm of Dennis, Kimball & Pope, is visiting the local manager of that firm, Chester Barr on business. They declare that the general outlook for both apples and pears is good and that market conditions are expected to be better in the east this year than last. Market conditions, Mr. Pope states are always good after a poor year and therefore should be good this year as 1922 was the worst year in the history of the fruit business. He leaves Medford Thursday for other fruit district centers on the coast.

The fire alarm at 2:20 this afternoon was caused by the Tomlin Box factory sawdust hopper catching fire again. The workmen at the factory had the fire out when the department arrived. This is the second time the sawdust bin has caught fire within the past several weeks, the first blaze having been more serious.

S. P. SCHEDULES CHANGED, SHASTA SERVICE BETTER

PORTLAND, Ore., May 1.—California cities will be brought nearer to Portland through readjustment of Southern Pacific main line train schedules which will drop off 1½ hours from the Shasta limited running time, with corresponding cuts in the schedule of other through trains. It was announced at the railroad offices here yesterday. Pre-war schedules are, in effect established. The changes are to become effective May 10.

Instead of leaving in the afternoon, as at present, the Shasta will depart at 8:30 a. m., the effect of which will be to give a daylight ride in both directions through Oregon. The Shasta will arrive in Portland at the same time as at present, 10:30 p. m.

Time on all through trains to the south will be shortened materially. Number 54 and number 16 will clip off two hours from the running time, number 15 one hour and a half, number 13 one hour and a quarter, number 11 one hour and number 53, forty minutes.

Radical changes in the running time both north and south of the passenger trains of the Southern Pacific railroad to go into effect May 10th, materially affect Medford and will make much difference in the arrival and departure of mail, parcel post and express in this city. Agent Montgomery received a copy of the schedule this morning.

Just what trains will carry mail to and from the city are not known yet, but Postmaster Warner expects to receive official notice to prepare to meet the coming changes, which are also expected to change the time of arrival of afternoon newspapers from Portland, and likewise newspapers from San Francisco. According to the new schedule just received the changes will be as follows:

North bound—No. 54 leaves San Francisco at 12:20 a. m., arrives Medford at 6:40 p. m., instead of 5:35 p. m., as now, arrive at Portland at 7:40 a. m.; No. 16, leave San Francisco 8:20 p. m., arrive Medford 6:05 p. m., instead of 7:13 p. m., as now, and arrive at Portland at 7:40 a. m.; No. 12 (Shasta) leave San Francisco at 7:40 p. m., arrives Medford 11:08 a. m., instead of 8:41 a. m., as now, and arrives in Portland at 10:30 p. m.; No. 14, leaves San Francisco at 10:20 a. m., arrive Medford 7:05 a. m., instead of 6:05 a. m., and arrive in Portland at 8:45 p. m.

South bound—No. 53, leaves Portland at 1 a. m., arrive at Medford 3 p. m., instead of 3:45 p. m., as now, and reach San Francisco at 9 a. m.; No. 15, leaves Portland at 9:30 a. m., arrives Medford 10:40 p. m., instead of 10:50 p. m., as now, and reaches San Francisco at 5:50 p. m.; No. 11 (Shasta) leaves Portland at 8:30 a. m., arrives Medford 7:42 p. m., instead of 3:50 a. m., as now, and arrives at San Francisco at 11:30 a. m.; No. 13, leaves Portland at 9 p. m., arrives Medford at 10:30 a. m., instead of 9:17 a. m., as now, and arrives at San Francisco at 8:10 a. m.
