## VANCE STRIKES OUT 15 GIANTS, BUT LOSES GAME

CHICAGO, May 3.—(By Associated Press.) It was record day for both major leagues yesterday and, oddly enough, the men who set the new marks played on losing teams. Dazzy Vance of Brooklyn struck out fifteen New York Giants in the ten innings that he pitched. Fourteen of the whiffs came in the first nine innings. Vance, however, allowed fourteen hits and four passes. The present record for strikeouts, 19 in nine innings, is held jointly by C. Sweeney, made with the Providence team in June, 1884, and H. Dady of Chicago, in the old Union association, who performed the same year. In spite of Vance's performance the Giants won in the eleventh, 7 to 6.

Everett Scott, Yankee shortstop, set a startling record for consecutive games played, when he participated in his 100th contest against the Senators.

Walter Johnson held the Yankees to three hits and Washington won, 3 to 0.

Detroit, by defeating Cleveland 4 to 3, passed the Yankees and tied the Indians for first place. Cobb used 17 players.

Rommell, Athletic star pitcher, scored his first win this season, defeating Boston 4 to 3. Elam Vangilder, Brown hurler allowed Chicago only three hits, but lost to the Sox 4 to 2, through wildness, coupled with errors by his teammates. A wild throw by Bobbe, Cincinnati infielder, gave the Chicago Cubs a 2 to 1 victory over the Reds.

The Boston Braves beat the Philadelphia Quakers 11 to 7 in a slugfest contest and won their sixth straight game.

The St. Louis Cardinals won from Pittsburgh 12 to 1, pounding three of the Pirate pitchers for 17 hits.

Harry Hollmann of Detroit has hit safely in every game this season so far. He poked a double against the Indians yesterday making sixteen consecutive games in which he has collected one or more hits.

**Thye Beats Karasick.**  
PORTLAND, Ore., May 3.—Ted Thye won over Al Karasick of Oakland, Cal., in a two-hour wrestling match here last night on a decision. There was only one fall and that went to Thye with a wristlock after they had been wrestling one hour 32 minutes.

## WILLING, OUMET TIED FOR PRIZE

SANDWICH, May 3.—(By Associated Press.) The St. George's challenge cup, one of the most important golf trophies in England, has been captured by the American invaders. Dr. O. F. Willing of Portland, Ore., and Francis Oumet of Boston, former American open champion, tied for first place in the two days' stroke competition which ended today with aggregate scores of 135 each. They will play 18 holes tomorrow to decide the winner.

Robert A. Gardner was third with a score of 154.

The American victory will put the St. George's cup into alien hands for the first time since its establishment 35 years ago. Actually the original cup of solid gold and one of Britain's finest golf trophies, is not handed over, the winner getting a reproduction of it.

It was over the same links on which the Americans won their success today that Walter Hagen last year wrested the British open championship.

Jens Sweetser, the American amateur champion, gave up at the seventeenth hole today. Sweetser took \$1 for the first round yesterday and was never able to get going in his usual style. He took 40 for the first nine on the second round.

Cyril Tolley, the English star, who had a 79 yesterday, gave up at the twelfth hole today, after taking 41 at the ninth.

Roger Wethered, the British star, who was defeated by Jack Hutchison in the play-off of a tie for the British open championship in 1921, was definitely put out of the running for the cup when he turned in a score of 81 for today's 18 holes, bringing his aggregate score to 157.

**SEARCHES WORLD FOR MASTER OF DEMPSEY**

NEW YORK, May 3.—Tex O'Rourke trainer of boxers, will sail for England Saturday to search for a British heavy weight capable of meeting Jack Dempsey, it was learned today.

Even if he does not find a man who can beat Dempsey, he is confident he will develop a man who will win the European heavyweight championship. A group of sportsmen interested in developing a genuine championship prospect is backing O'Rourke.

## Jack Dempsey to Train In Dempsey City, Utah

SPOKANE, May 3.—An invitation extended yesterday by local interests to Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, to train in Spokane for his contemplated bout with Tommy Gibbons, at Shelby, Mont., July 4, was declined by Dempsey today.

"Appreciate your invitation but have arranged to train at Dempsey City, Utah," Dempsey telegraphed from Price, Utah.

## MEXICANS CURSE OUT U. S. A. AND CATHOLIC CHURCH

CHIHUAHUA CITY, Mexico, May 3.—Protesting the execution of eight labor leaders in Chicago May 1, 1886, resulting from the Haymarket riots, 500 members of the State Federation of Labor here paraded through the streets yesterday displaying the red and black flags of communism and halted in front of the American consulate to deliver a memorial to President Harding for the release of 61 communist agitators held in American federal penitentiaries. Other labor day celebrations by the communists were numerous.

The American consulate was closed on account of the legal holiday. Labor leaders were advised that any memorial for the president of the United States should be transmitted through the Mexican embassy at Washington.

Communist speakers then called Americans "cowards by inheritance" and said "that nation which calls itself civilized proves itself more uncivilized than we are."

These statements were delivered in front of the American consulate, where the government of the United States and the Roman Catholic religion also were criticized.
