

RADIO IS ASSURED FIRST METHODIST SUNDAY EVENING

"The disappointment of failing to get the bishop's address over the radio last Sunday evening was a severe blow. I have hardly recovered from it yet," said Rev. J. R. Sasnett this morning. Discussing the incident further the minister said that he and Mr. Virgin had discovered the causes for the failure, and that they plan a "come-back" for tomorrow evening's service.

To assure results an aerial has been strung from the Y. W. C. A. building to the highest gable of the church, and a special Federal set installed for the occasion. It will be operated by Mr. Virgin himself.

"Mr. Virgin and I spent the evening at the church last night subjecting the receiving apparatus to every imaginable test, and got excellent results," said Mr. Sasnett. "We picked up the Oregonian readily, got San Francisco clearly, and Los Angeles stations came in so loud and distinctly that the numbers could be heard in another room behind closed doors. So, while people as a rule expect too much of radio as yet, we feel assured of excellent results tomorrow evening."

"Many remained last Sunday evening until after ten o'clock, so it is evident they like the enchantment of radio. We hope to give them a real excursion thence tomorrow night" enthusiastically concluded the minister.

Greatest Resources of Jackson County

In the upper Rogue River Valley, half way between Medford and the Crater Lake, from the foot of Mt. McLaughlin to the summit of the Umpqua water shed, are located Oregon's greatest resources. They are timber, water power and play grounds.
