

J. W. DRESSLER CO. BUYS BIG TRACT ON ROGUE RIVER

The property known as the Gordon tract which extends for one mile on the Pacific highway from the Jackson-Josephine county line toward Grants Pass and from the waters of the Rogue back to the foothills, has been sold by Mr. Gordon to J. W. Dressler Co., which firm of real estate dealers of Medford is composed of J. W. Dressler and John M. Root.

This property, declare the newcomers, is the most beautiful and attractive location anywhere on the Pacific highway—where the summer breezes from the Pacific ocean bring rest and comfort.

The Rogue river at this point is a most charming stretch of water and affords the best of fishing—almost all of the big catches reported are taken at this place. A tentative prospectus composed by Dressler & Root follows:

"The early season catches are salmon fresh from the ocean, July and August, and weigh from 20 to 50 pounds each—some thrill for the fisherman for from one-half to three quarters of an hour. Later in the season this part of the river abounds in steelheads and cutthroat trout, and boat fishing at that—much pleasanter than wading—so the ladies can enjoy this sport to the fullest extent. Last week the wife of a tourist landed the first fish she ever caught—a 25 pound salmon. Probably Mr. Tourist will never hear the last of that."

J. W. Dressler Co., immediately after acquiring this property, made a deal with A. E. Smith, a most enthusiastic sportsman from Montana, for a tract of ground immediately below the great dam of the Grants Pass Irrigation District, where he and his wife are at work with a force of men developing a most artistic camp ground, service station, etc. The camp grounds will be for all time absolutely open and free for the use of the general public for fishing and picnics and every facility for comfort and sanitation installed. A drilled well is now completed and springs of pure cold water are developed furnishing pure water for all. The house of welcome now being constructed by Mr. Smith is of peeled logs, 50x40 feet and two stories. The reception and lounge room 20x40 feet with a great fireplace will be made most attractive to the welcomed tourist.

In plating this property the building sites will be not less than 100 feet fronting on the paved boulevard and prices fixed to attract the construction of pretty cottages, where during the summer months the tired business man and family can enjoy vacation in fishing, hunting and mountain climbing in a locality only surpassed by a few of the Swiss resorts. Last Sunday was quite cold and unpleasant, still over 100 autos visited this place. It is hoped that a larger number will be there next Sunday, where a cordial welcome to all visitors from Grants Pass, Ashland, Medford and all other points will be extended to all who may call for a short while or enjoy a picnic day—a veritable playground for old and young.

P. F. E. WILL HAVE 5030 NEW CARS BY AUGUST FIRST

All of the 5030 standard refrigerator cars ordered by the Pacific Fruit Express company early in the year will be completed and in the service of western shippers of perishables by August, according to C. M. Secrist, vice-president and general manager of the company. Secrist yesterday made public an estimate of the number of new cars which will be delivered to the company each month starting with May.

According to Secrist's figures, 950 new cars will be delivered in May, 1757 in June, 1573 in July and 750 in August. The last of an earlier order of 3,300 refrigerator cars have now been delivered.

VISITING YEOMAN CONSIDER SITE OF SCHOOL IN VALLEY

The delegation of Yeomen officials looking for a site for their fifteen million dollar children's home left this morning for San Francisco after a day's visit here with chamber of commerce officials who brought them from Roseburg yesterday by auto.

Among the local men who made the trip to Roseburg Thursday to meet the delegation were: H. E. Harder, C. M. English, A. H. Miller, John W. Johnson, H. C. Frohbach and Vernon Vawter. The Medford men stayed in Roseburg Thursday night and brought the party to Grants Pass Friday morning where the Grants Pass chamber of commerce entertained the entire delegation at luncheon.

Carl Fichtner and Elton Beeson representing Medford and Talent Home-stands of the Yeomen, and J. W. Wakefield and Ed M. White met the delegation at Grants Pass and accompanied them to Medford.

Mr. and Mrs. Senn of Minneapolis, Mr. and Mrs. Vrooman of Kansas City, Mr. and Mrs. Frink of Des Moines and Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Ezall of Portland were members of the party which was shown the proposed site near Medford. Senn is grand treasurer of the American Brotherhood of Yeomen, Mr. Vrooman is a member of the children's home committee, Mr. Frink is president of the order, and Mr. Ezall is state manager of Oregon.

Mark T. McKee, of Detroit, chairman of the children's home committee did not visit Medford as he was called home from Eugene several days ago. He will return, however to inspect the site near Medford in June.

All of the delegation was entertained at a dinner at the Hotel Medford last evening by the old and new directors of the Medford chamber of commerce. At that time the advantages of the Rogue River valley were made known to the Yeomen and as climate is a big factor in the establishment of the home it is felt by local officials that the Rogue River valley will be favorably considered.

The home will represent an initial investment of \$1,500,000, and a final investment of fifteen million. It will house from 1100 to 1500 children who will be educated in the home which will be a standard public school. The high school will be an accredited high school. Following the graduation of the child from high school an advantage of a college education will be given him if he wishes to borrow the money to put him through college with the privilege of paying it back at a later date.

The aim of the institution will be correct upbringing of the children with emphasis on the development of good characters and well proportioned minds and bodies. It will be known as the "City of Childhood."

J. DEMPSEY WILL RECEIVE \$300,000 BEFORE THE FIGHT

CHICAGO, May 5.—Before he even strikes a blow, Jack Dempsey, world heavyweight champion, will receive \$300,000 for defending his title against Tom Gibbons of St. Paul in a fifteen round decision contest at Shelby, Mont., July 4. Gibbons will take a percentage of the gate receipts after the \$300,000 mark has been reached in the box office.

Dempsey is to get the first \$100,000 today if he can raise a bond of \$100,000, as stipulated by Montana backers. That bond is the only apparent obstacle to the match. The money will be paid to Kearns, Dempsey's manager, and then he will attach his signature to the contract.

Gibbons will receive fifty per cent of the gate receipts up to the \$6,000 mark and 25 per cent over that. He will be allowed \$2,500 for training expenses while Dempsey will be given \$10,000.

A compromise settled the dispute over the referee question caused when Kearns named Jimmy Daugherty of Philadelphia, Eddie Kane, manager of Gibbons, refused to accept him. Kearns said he would name another referee today. Kane has already made arrangements to post a \$25,000 guarantee for his boxer.

Hard Fought Games.

CHICAGO, May 5.—(By the Associated Press)—A close, hard fight in games nudged play in the major leagues yesterday, half of the contests going into extra innings.

The first division clubs in the National beat their second division opponents and in the American the result was nearly reversed.

The New York Giants were outbitten by Philadelphia in thirteen innings, but won, 11 to 9. The cellar White Sox of Chicago checked the onrush of Detroit in the American, 4 to 1. Red Faber won his first game of the season after six attempts.

Marty Callaghan, Chicago left fielder, stole home in the tenth and the Cubs took a ten inning contest from St. Louis, 2 to 1.

Rube Marquard, in his ancient form pitched Boston to the other extra distance contest in the National over Brooklyn, 1 to 0. It went thirteen innings and was the sixth out of the

last seven games that the Robins have lost by one run margins. Charlie Grimm, Pirate first sacker, hit in his seventeenth game this year and his team mates batted savagely, downing Cincinnati, 11 to 6. St. Louis defeated Cleveland, 9 to 5, the Brown sluggers making three home runs to one for the Indians. The Athletics, showing real aggressiveness, battered down the Yanks, 8 to 6, in ten innings, while Washington was evening its standing with Boston, 7 to 4.
