

CRATER L. HIGHWAY IN AWFUL SHAPE M'CLOUD-PROSPECT

There has been much complaint on the part of people who travel the road between here and Prospect about the deplorable stretch of road, about five and one-half miles in extent between M'Cloud and Prospect in the Florence Rock neighborhood. The condition of this road is so bad that Superintendent Thomson of Crater National park declares it is a disgrace to Oregon.

The near approach of the Crater Lake tourist season makes it seem imperative that the ruts and chuck holes in this stretch be done away with as soon as possible. Superintendent Thomson has made arrangements to bring the matter directly to the attention of the county court.

The trouble is that although the contract has been let for a new high way at this point, the work will not be done until late next fall.

The road between here and Crater Lake is now open as far as the snow line, about five and one-fourth miles beyond Union creek, which means that cars can now only go as far as the snow line. According to James Grieve of Prospect never before, so far as known, has the road been open to within such a close distance of Crater National park early in May. It breaks the record in this regard by about two weeks.

There are 10 feet and six inches of snow at the lake rim, and six feet and seven inches at Anna Spring camp.

Superintendent Thomson expects to make his first visit to the lake some time this week, going in by way of Klamath Falls and Fort Klamath and from there on skis. He expects to start in with a large crew on June 1st to clear away the snow between the lake and the snow line, beginning at the lake end first and working this way.

MUST STOP SNAGGING SUCKERS, BEAR CREEK

Small boys have been snagging numerous suckers in Bear Creek and leaving the dead fish in the vicinity of the City Auto Camp, thereby making portions of the creek and bank offensive. They are warned to discontinue this practice as well as that of snagging catfish.

W. R. Coleman, deputy state game warden, announces that he hopes the boys snag every sucker in Bear creek, but warns them to take them away and not throw them back into the water or leave them on the bank to pollute both atmosphere and water. As to the catfish, it is lawful to catch them only with hook and line. They were planted in Bear creek nine years ago by V. J. Emerick and a friend and are now becoming large and numerous enough to be caught once in a while. If they are left unmolested the youth of this vicinity will have good and enjoyable fishing in a few more years. If they are snagged and otherwise destroyed the sport will also be destroyed.

TOURISTS NEAR DEATH

Men in Danger.
PERKING, May 7.—Reports trickling in here slowly today from the Shantung border at Licheng where early yesterday 1900 bandits seized the Shanghai-Peking express train on the Tientsin-Pukow railway and took captive 150 of its passengers, indicate that one foreigner, a British subject named Rothman, was killed and that a number of Americans, probably men, stood in peril at the mercy of the brigands this afternoon.

mercy of the brigands this afternoon. Troops were believed to be pursuing the bandit army. Among the Americans reported held were Robert Scripps, the newspaper publisher; Major Pinger and two other officers of the American army, named Roland and Allen, all three in the Philippine service; four others whose names were given as Henry, Lee, Solomon and Levy. The passengers included 39 foreigners, and ten of them escaped or were released. The outlaw horde, having de-railed the forward part of the train by means of a broken track, fired a volley toward the coaches.

Major Pinger's two sons also were taken prisoner. But Mrs. Pinger escaped.

The captives included J. B. Powell, editor of the Weekly Review at Shanghai.

NEW YORK, May 7.—(By the Associated Press)—The lure of travel took Miss Lucy Aldrich, sister of Mrs. John D. Rockefeller, Jr., to China, where she was captured by bandits. She was circumnavigating the globe for the second time.

Her brother, Winthrop Aldrich, a member of the Rockefeller firm of attorneys, said today he was glad to get the news of her release, as the Standard Oil company's wife facilities had left him in ignorance, probably because its offices in China were closed on Sundays.

Miss Aldrich took with her as companion Miss Minnie McFadden of Providence, R. I., and a maid. Both have been released.

Miss Aldrich, daughter of the late Senator Nelson W. Aldrich of Rhode Island, noted tariff maker, is wealthy in her own right.

Robert Scripps Caught.
SAN DIEGO, Cal., May 7.—In private telegram received here from Washington today it was reported from China that Robert Scripps, the newspaper publisher, formerly of this city, had been captured by the Chinese bandits who seized the Shanghai-Peking express train on the Shantung border yesterday. It was said, however, that the other members of the party aboard Mr. Scripps' yacht were not on the train. He had left for the interior alone, according to the telegrams.

With Mr. Scripps on the yacht were his wife, his father, E. W. Scripps and others whose names are not known here. The Scripps yacht, the Ohio, left here March 19 for the Orient. The yacht is believed to have remained at Shanghai while Robert Scripps went to Peking.

Story of Bandit Attack
TIENSTIN, May 7.—(By Associated Press.) A relief train arrived here this morning with a party of foreigners who escaped when the Shanghai-Peking express train was held up yesterday by a large force of bandits at Licheng.

In the party were Mrs. Robert Allen and Mrs. Pinger and the latter's younger son.

The women stated that their husbands, who are majors in the American army and the Pingers' elder son, were kidnapped.

The Americans told a graphic tale of their experiences. The bandits, they said, started firing upon the train before it was derailed and swarmed about it, smashing the windows with their hatchets, when it was brought to a standstill. They then entered the cars and robbed the passengers of valuables, visiting some of the coaches three times to be sure of missing nothing. One foreigner was killed but his identity was not known to the party arriving here.

It was nearly two hours after the train had been stopped that a warning whistle was blown and the bandits decamped with their captives. A few of the foreigners escaped by hiding in the long grass but more than twenty were carried off, including six women.

Mrs. Allen and Mrs. Pinger were left behind when it was found they were unable to keep up with the fast pace set by the bandits.

Major Pinger and his wife kept in touch for a time by shouting to each other, but the voice of the major, who was ahead, grew fainter and finally ceased, and his wife returned to the train with her younger son.

It is estimated that about 115 passengers were kidnapped, most of them in their night attire and without their baggage. They were forced to walk barefoot over the broken glass in the vicinity of the train and were hustled by their brutal guards over the rough country as the bandits fled in fear of pursuit.

Soldiers arrived at the scene soon after the departure of the raiding party and the government ordered the tachsuns (military governors) of the neighboring provinces immediately to take up the pursuit.

A complete list of the kidnapped foreigners is not available here, but an American broker named Henley, an Italian lawyer, Musso, and a number of English women, are believed to be among them.

Close Race in Big Leagues
CHICAGO, May 7.—(By Associated Press.) Nearing the finish of three weeks of play, the races in both major baseball leagues have disclosed keener competition than in most seasons.

There were only four places in the American league when play started today. One team was in first, two in second, one in third and four tied for fourth, and three were tied for third in the National.

Though they lost to the Philadelphia Athletics, the sensation team of the season—5 to 1, before 55,000 people, the New York Yankees managed to start a road trip in first place, as both Detroit and Cleveland lost. By defeating Boston 4 to 1, Washington became level with the Red Sox and enabled Chicago, which won its third straight from Detroit 4 to 3, and St. Louis, which won a ninth inning thriller from Cleveland 5 to 4, to go into a four cornered tie for fourth place.

Chicago and Pittsburgh both lost ground in the National by losing while New York and Boston were idle. Thru its victory over the Cubs, 16 to 4, St. Louis went into a tie for third place with Pittsburgh which lost to Cincinnati 8 to 7. Brooklyn made a motion toward getting out of the cellar by downing Philadelphia 7 to 4.

Rogers Hornsby, main home run hitter last year, made two circuit swats, bringing his season total to four, and Charlie Grimm, Pirate first sacker, hit safely, keeping his consecutive record for the season clear. He has hit safely in the nineteen games played this season.

Tris Speaker of the Indians, because it is alleged he got exceedingly "lippy" toward Umpire Ormsby Wednesday at Detroit, has been suspended for a while.

OREGON GOLF MEET MONDAY, JUNE 18

PORTLAND, Ore., May 7.—Plans for the 1933 Oregon state golf championship meet on Waverly links here have been practically completed. The women's qualifying round will be played Monday, June 18, the first elimination round Tuesday, the men's qualifying round Wednesday and the championship rounds thereafter, the championships closing Saturday.

Dr. O. F. Willing, winner of the championship honors in 1921 and 1922 will not be on hand to participate in the tourney, as the Walker cup matches are scheduled to begin on the same day that the state event opens.

Only two special events outside of the clock and ladder golf features are scheduled. The mixed foursomes will be held Friday afternoon, June 22 and a men's handicap on Saturday afternoon, June 23.

Build Portland Track
PORTLAND, Ore., May 7.—J. J. McCall, president and secretary of the Oregon-Washington Racing association, newly organized has announced that a one-mile track will be constructed within eight miles of Portland immediately to take care of the Portland meeting of the circuit.

Preliminary to the circuit, the association is sponsoring several meetings, the first of which will be held at Vancouver, Wash., next Sunday.

If this venture proves a success it will be followed by another meet in June on the same track.

Tommy Gibbons to Rest.
ST. PAUL, Minn., May 7.—Confirmation of the signing of articles for his fight July 4 with Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, has been received by Tommy Gibbons, St. Paul challenger, from his manager, Eddie Kane.

Gibbons will spend several days at his new home here before going to his summer cottage at Oakdale, Minn., for a ten day rest.

PORTLAND PLAYER IN THIRD PLACE BATTING AVERAGE

SAN FRANCISCO, May 7.—Waner, San Francisco, having played in ten games and made 24 trips to the plate, has pounded out thirteen hits, which netted an average of .542. Schang, Sacramento, is next with a percentage of .529, and Jones, Portland, is third with .417 to his credit. The averages include Saturday's games of the Pacific Coast league.

Other sluggers, who have piled up fat percentages are Murphy, Vernon, .395; Walsh, San Francisco, .394; Coubie, Salt Lake, .391; Peters, Salt Lake .387; Ellison, San Francisco .380; Krug, Los Angeles, .379; Valla, San Francisco, .374; Strand, Salt Lake, .373; Twombly, Los Angeles, .370; Hendrix, San Francisco, .366; Yaryan, Seattle, .357; Lane, Seattle, .356; Compton, San Francisco and King, Portland, each garnered a percentage of .355.

Wolverton, Seattle made one trip to the plate and pounded out one hit, giving him a percentage of 1.000. For base stealing, Lane, Seattle, easily outdistanced all others in the league by having copped eleven steals. Kopp, Sacramento, was second with nine and Johnson, Seattle, came third with seven to his credit. Valla, San Francisco, obtained six; Kilduff, San Francisco and Janvris, Seattle, both got five, while Krug, Los Angeles, Grisset, Portland, Eldred, Seattle, Cooper, Oakland, Mollwitz, Sacramento, Rhyne, San Francisco, McCann, Portland and Hood, Los Angeles, all are credited with four steals each.

As likely that the negotiations will be halted until the Chinese authorities have shown a willingness to make adequate amends for the Shantung bandit raid.

The state department is depending on Mr. Schurman to take all necessary steps to ascertain all the facts and to secure proper action by the Chinese government. More detailed instructions will be sent to him, however, when a clearer picture of the situation is obtainable.

Although they had no official list of Americans involved in the raid, officials here checked over carefully

the lists of names carried in press dispatches and sought to establish the facts so far as possible from passport and other records.

At the war department it was said there was no army officer by the name of Roland stationed in the Philippines and it was believed possible that mention of such a name was due to confusion in the name of Major Roland W. Pinger, of the ordnance department, who is in China, accompanied by his family. The residence of his mother is given in department records as Minneapolis, and he is a graduate of the University of California.

Major Robert A. Allen is an officer in the medical corps, who was born in Lena, Ill., and before entering the service was a practicing physician at Tacoma, Wash. He is a graduate of Beloit college and Northwestern university. State department passport records show that Jerome Arthur Henley, San Francisco, applied for a passport to visit China. He is believed to be the J. A. Henley included in the list of Americans on the train.

Leon Solomon, New York City, also has a passport to travel in the far east.

John Powell, of Pittsburg, Pa., according to the records, went to Italy from the United States and there obtained an extension to his passport which may have been used by him in China. He gave his occupation as a chauffeur. J. P. Powell, an insurance agent of Memphis, Tenn., obtained a passport to Cuba, but the records show no extension. Nothing is known here of a Powell, connected with the Weekly Review.

Miss Edith Schonberger of Naugatuck, Conn., holds a passport and may be the Miss Schonberger mentioned in press dispatches.

QUINCY, Ill., May 7.—John S. Powell, the newspaper publisher of Shanghai, China, announced among those captured by Chinese bandits on the Shantung border, is a former resident of Quincy, and began his newspaper career here as a reporter for the Quincy Whig some twenty years ago.

Several years ago, Powell went to China, where he established the Shanghai Weekly Review and became correspondent for several American newspapers.

HANNIBAL, Mo., May 7.—Verification of the capture of John B. Powell, former Missourian, by Chinese bandits was received today by J. P. Hinton of Hannibal, Powell's father-in-law, in a cablegram from Mrs. Powell who is in Shanghai. The message stated that Powell had been captured in Shantung.

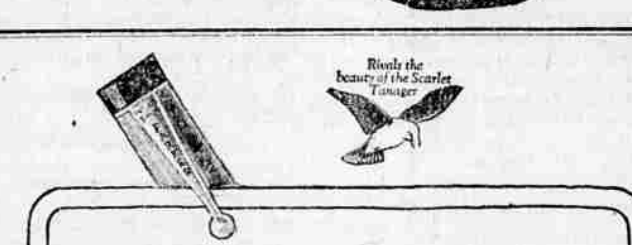
