I. W. W.'S EJECTED BY VIGILANTES IN IDAHO TOWN

BONNERS FERRY, Idaho, May 8.—This town was quiet today and no further trouble was expected, following the deportation into Montana yesterday of 28 alleged members of the Industrial Workers of the World.

Patrols of businessmen will continue to meet every incoming freight train and automobile stage. It was announced today, but it is not believed that state troops will be requested.

Yesterday's deportation was carried out without a show of arms on either side, it was stated today.

When a few of the deportees objected to the procedure on the ground that "America is a free country," they were warned to keep quiet and complied.

The action followed acquittal by a jury Saturday of 36 alleged I. W. W. who were charged with unlawful assembly after they had obtained a permit.

HELENA, Mont., May 8.—Governor Dixon contemplates no official action with reference to the 25 alleged members of the I. W. W. deported from Bonners Ferry, Ida., into Montana, he stated today. "So long as the new arrivals behave themselves and act as orderly citizens, I see no reason why they should be molested in this state," Governor Dixon said. "The matter has not been brought to my attention officially and I do not contemplate action in regard to the matter."

W. C. T. U. ATTENDS MINISTER'S TRIAL

YAKIMA, Wash., May 8.—Mrs. Clara Snyder, secretary of the Community church of Yakima, was the principal witness today in the \$50,000 libel suit brought by T. L. Tennant against Rev. F. C. Whitney, pastor of the Calvary Baptist church.

Mrs. Snyder was formerly Tennant's housekeeper. Tennant is suing because of criticisms by Whitney, following the former's acquittal on a "booze" charge. He has entered a plea of justification. Mrs. Snyder testified that Tennant had "liquor bottles, big ones, small ones, wide ones and narrow ones," in his desk but on cross examination admitted she had not tested the contents and her evidence was ordered stricken out.

Delegations of W. C. T. U. members, headed by Mrs. Hester Tibbets, who recently celebrated her 78th birthday, are attending the trial. The "white ribbons," spend the day knitting but keep close track of the testimony offered.

Coast Guard Ship Safe

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., May 8.—The Q-15, U. S. N. coast guard vessel reported lost at sea since May 5, dropped anchor in Bayboro harbor here late last night, following a rough time on the high seas, but at no time was she in serious danger.

STANDARD OIL CO. RAISES WAGES FOR 22,000 EMPLOYEES

CHICAGO, May 8.—An advance in wages amounting to \$2,500,000 a year for 22,000 employees of the Standard Oil company of Indiana, granted by the board of directors of the company on the theory that the existing economic situation warranted it, was announced today by the company officials.

An increase of five cents an hour, effective May 16, will apply to a great majority of the employees working in refineries of the company at Whiting, Ind., Wood River, Ill., Sugar Creek, Mo., Casper, Greybull and Laramie, Wyo., who are working on an hourly basis.

In some instances the advance will be less than five cents an hour, while in about an equal number of cases the advance will amount to more than that sum.

Employees on a salary basis, the announcement stated, in all departments of the company, will have an adjustment of their salaries July 1.

CHANGE IN OFFICE HOURS

URGED TO EASE TRAFFIC RUSH

TOKIO.—The Tokio Electric Bureau, which operates the street car system of the city, has adopted new measures to relieve congestion at the rush hours. It has asked the banks and business concerns of Marunouchi, the Wall Street district of Tokio, to rearrange the hours of their employees so that all will not arrive at and leave their offices at the same time.

A recent investigation revealed that about 200,000 persons employed in offices in the Marunouchi district ride on the cars between 8 and 9 o'clock in the morning, and between 5 and 6 o'clock in the afternoon. It is believed the present traffic jam will be eliminated if half of the workers arrive and depart half an hour earlier than the rest.

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205,000 WORKERS IN DETROIT AUTO INDUSTRY ALONE

DETROIT, May 8.—Half the industrial employees in Detroit in 1914 were employed in the automobile or allied industries. Today approximately two-thirds of the industrial employees here are working either in automobile plants or in factories closely allied to the automotive industry.

Officials of the Detroit Board of Commerce, make the announcement to show the rapid growth of the automobile industry. At the same time it is recalled that during the same period the population of Detroit has more than doubled.

In 1914 Detroit had a total of 112,483 industrial employees, and of the number about 56,000 worked in automobile or accessory plants. Today the city has approximately 320,000 industrial workers, and of these about 205,000 are employed either in automobile plants or in establishments where parts of motor cars or motors are produced.

The number of automobiles made in Michigan every year is about 80 per cent of the total output of the country, according to statisticians of the board of commerce.
