

CLUB PROGRAM FOR CONVENTION IS TAKING SHAPE

The program for the 23d annual convention of the Oregon Federation of Women's club to be held in Medford May 21-24 inclusive, is rapidly taking form, according to Mrs. Sadie Orr-Dunbar, chairman of the program committee.

"The convention program this year will be distinctive in that it will be given largely by the club women themselves," said Mrs. Dunbar. "The reports of the achievements of the individual clubs during the past year, given by their presidents, will constitute one session, probably the afternoon of the first day, thus placing before the convention the work and the interests of the clubs for exchange of ideas and discussion at the subsequent sessions. This plan was adopted at the suggestion of the majority of presidents throughout the state. The department and division heads and chairmen of standing committees will also have prominent places on the program."

A reception will be tendered the delegates Monday evening, May 21, in the First Presbyterian church, at which time there will be addresses of welcome by the mayor of Medford, Earl C. Gaddis, by the president of the chamber of commerce and by Mrs. F. E. Merrick, president of the Greater Medford club, the hostess organization. The response will be made by Mrs. William Bell, of Roseburg, second vice president of the federation.

Reports of officers and chairmen of standing committees will occupy the Tuesday morning session. These will include scholarship loan fund, Miss Jessie McGreggor, chairman; endowment fund, Mrs. Arthur H. Johnston, chairman; Chautauqua, Mrs. Rosina Fouts-Evans, chairman; extension, Mrs. William Bell, chairman; Indian welfare, Mrs. Ada B. Millican, chairman; transportation, Mrs. George W. McMath, chairman. The afternoon session will be given over to club reports by presidents, followed by a reception at the home of Mrs. Frank G. Owen.

MILLIONS OF U. S. TREES ARE SENT TO FRANCE

NEW YORK, May 8.—Millions of "good will" delegates mailed from this port today for France. These "good will" delegates are American trade goods presented to the French government for reforesting battle areas by Charles Lathrop Pack, president of the American Tree association. A similar shipment was turned over to the British Embassy at Washington a few days ago.

Today's shipment had been presented to Ambassador Jusserand in Washington and here M. Barret, the acting consul general received them. The goods will be turned over to the French Commissioner of Agriculture in Paris and will be placed in nurseries until ready for transplanting as seedlings.

Miss Phillips gives a highly dramatic portrayal of the screen star who achieves unquestioned success professionally but is an inglorious failure when it comes to matrimony.

"The Flirt," Booth Tarkington's vivid cross-section of American home life, will be shown at the Page theatre beginning tomorrow matinee. It is a dramatization of Booth Tarkington's famous novel. Eileen Percy, Helen Jerome Eddy, George Nichols and ten other notable players give a powerful characterization of this masterpiece.

It is said that heart interest is the soul of every great film and as this drama has this human touch it places it high in the category of great pictures. It is a picture that has many tense and dramatic situations with an appeal to the heart that will bring the tears one moment and laughter the next.

A note on the program of The Hindu by the author, urged the audience not to take the play too seriously. Excellent advice. Those who were foolish enough to take Mr. Walker Whiteside and his company seriously, as the play was presented at the Page last night found the performance as full of holes as a Swiss cheese. But those who followed the author's suggestion, and accepted the performance as a melodramatic extravaganza, had a pleasant evening full of thrills, shocks, and surprises, with considerable atmosphere, gun play and theatrical mechanics thrown in for good measure.

Why a clever Scotland Yard subordinate, familiar with the plot to steal the priceless moonstone, and an accessory in good standing, should have failed to place an automatic against the head of the Master Mind early in the game, the author did not explain, perhaps because if he had explained there would have been no excuse for two very exciting acts, including an old fashioned seduction scene, put on by the chief detective and his lawful wife!

The important point concerning The Hindu is that Barum was right. The people love to be humbugged particularly if the thing is done artistically, and everyone is allowed to get a kick out of it. Why bother about such academic things as construction, reality, restraint and plausibility, if you can have your back hair put on end, every three minutes, and have the lady on your right jump out of her seat with a Comanche yell, when a snake jumps out of a teakwood box. The play's the thing. And the Hindu as put on by Mr. Whiteside, was a genuine thriller for anyone who followed the author's prefatory advice.

There were only four principals of any distinction in last night's performance. Mr. Whiteside, of course as the Hindu, Miss Sydney Shields as the lady detective, Mr. Harold Vosburgh as Mr. Morgan and Harold De Becker as Harl. The rest of the cast were "fillers." The stage settings were attractive and effective, the stage business well done. It was, in short, a good show, if you were sensible enough to check your critical faculty at the front door.

Ina Claire Coming
At the Page theatre, Monday evening, May 14, Ina Claire is to be seen in the brilliant comedy in which she is now meeting with similar success at the Columbia theatre, San Francisco.

Miss Claire's comedy is "The Awful Truth," from the pen of Arthur Richman, a young playwright recalled agreeably as the author of "Not So Long Ago" and "Ambush." Miss Claire appears as Lucy Warriner, a young, beautiful and fashionable divorcee whom financial necessity has brought to the brink of a desirable second matrimonial alliance. A rich, though rather crude, westerner turns out to be the most likely candidate for this honor. Eager to marry the woman for whom he has developed a real infatuation, the gentleman is halted when an over-shrewd aunt hints to him that in his fiancée's divorce suit there had been a suspicion that Lucy herself had not been altogether blameless. The latter, undaunted, summons to her defense none other than her ex-husband, who gallantly responds. The situations in which the three find themselves, rapidly following one another in most amusing sequence, may well be imagined and the outcome is at once unexpected and surprising.

Principal in Miss Claire's support is Bruce McRae, a player at once well-known and popular here, and an unusually brilliant cast.
