PROMISE BETTER WATER SERVICE IN OAKDALE DISTRICT

The annual summer irrigation restrictions for water users commenced today, one week earlier than last year and City Superintendent Davis says the regulations will be strictly enforced.

A new rule this year is that Sunday sprinkling hours will be the same as all other days, 4 to 10 a. m., and 4 to 10 p. m. All hours of sprinkling are one hour shorter this year for every day, ending at 10 a. m., or 10 p. m., according to where you live.

Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Sunday morning are the times for those residing on the east side of streets running north and south and north side of streets running east and west.

Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday and Sunday afternoon for all living on west side of streets running north and south side of streets running east and west.

Corner property is governed by street on which the house is numbered.

City Superintendent Davis says they are preparing to lay another line of 16-inch pipe across Bear Creek to connect with the south Oakdale line to give better service in the south part of the city.

Elect Congressman in Washington Sept. 25

OLYMPIA, May 9.—The special election to choose a successor to J. Stanley Webster, who has resigned as congressman in the fifth district, was set for September 25 by Governor Hart yesterday. The primary, to nominate candidates, was set for June 19.

Congressman Webster, re-elected last November for the term ending March 14, 1925, resigned to accept appointment as United States district judge for eastern Washington.

FROST DAMAGES JOSEPHINE COUNTY PEARS AND APPLES

PORTLAND, Ore., May 9.—Frost caused serious damage to pears, peaches and apples in Josephine county during the past week, says the crop report issued today by the weather bureau here. Some local damage was caused in other counties. The cold weather at the close of last week and beginning in this week was unfavorable for pollination of apples and there is some complaint of dropping of pears and a light set of pears and cherries, but on the whole the fruit crop is in fair to good condition and in some instances it is excellent.

Winter wheat continued to do well in most sections of Oregon; it is standing out in central counties and is in the boot in some of the warmer western localities. Seeding of spring wheat and oats is generally nearly complete except in elevated districts. Early sown spring grain is doing well, but rain is needed for that which was sown late.

MEDFORD POISON BRAN SAVES DAY TULE LAKE AREA

KLAMATH FALLS, May 9.—M. C. Stewart and L. B. Regan, former service men with homesteads in the Tule lake area, saved the day for the grasshopper drive when they returned from Medford Saturday with 2800 pounds of bran, which they hauled in one car with a trailer.

When it was found, on the eve of the poisoning campaign, that there was no bran available in Klamath county, the two homesteaders volunteered their services. Although the load seemed excessive for a touring car to haul, they successfully made the trip, negotiating Topsy grade without trouble. Without the bran the poisoning would have been at a standstill, and their volunteer services were highly appreciated by the county agent's office.

Stewart, who drove the car, lost one leg on the Marne in France. Regan was with the railway division in France. Both took up homesteads in the recent Tule lake land opening.
