WATER SITUATION IS DISCUSSED BY NEW COMMISSION

The city water commission at its meeting held last night ordered the summer water restrictions to go into effect tomorrow. This action was taken because since the present warm spell began the general irrigating of lawns and gardens proved such a drain on the water supply that the pressure was greatly reduced in parts of the city.

The action was greatly influenced also by the fact that due to Medford's growth and the many new homes erected within the city during the past 12 months, necessitating the establishment of so many new taps, much more water will be consumed in Medford this summer whereas the supply will not be increased.

A number of citizens labor under the delusion that the building of an additional reservoir will furnish the city more of a water supply. The new reservoir, which will not be ready for use for some time yet, is simply a reinforcement of the present reservoir, to be used in emergency or in case something should happen to the present one. The city water board is giving much time in study of the water question with a view to adopting plans for an additional or in-

creased supply, but the present supply cannot be increased this summer.

The new water regulations divide the city into districts for irrigating at stipulated times, the same as last year but require two hours less daily irrigating on irrigation days than heretofore. The irrigating hours now are from 4 a. m. to 10 a. m. instead of from 4 a. m. to 11 a. m., as last year, and from 4 p. m. until 10 p. m. instead of 4 p. m. to 11 p. m., as last year.

A large advertisement by the water board commission explaining the details of the restrictions appears elsewhere in this paper.

The city water commission was in session last night until 11 o'clock discussing the water situation in general. The members present were P. M. Calkins, H. L. Walther, A. L. Hill, Delroy Getchell and Olen Arnsperger. The members drew by lot the time of duration of each upon the water commission, they having been appointed originally to the commission by the city council.

The terms drawn were as follows: Walther, five years; Getchell, four years; Hill, three years; Calkins, two years and Arnsperger, one year.

4:00 A. M. to 10:00 A. M.
4:00 P. M. to 10:00 P. M.

MONDAY, WEDNESDAY AND FRIDAY, on the East side of the Streets running North and South, and North side of all Streets running East and West.

TUESDAY, THURSDAY AND SATURDAY, on the West side of all Streets running North and South, and on the South side of all Streets running East and West.

SUNDAY 4 A. M. TO 10 A. M. on the East side of all Streets running North and South, and the North side of all Streets running East and West.

SUNDAY 4 P. M. TO 10 P. M. on the West side of all Streets running North and South, and on the South side of all Streets running East and West.
