PROMINENT FRUIT MAN SEES GOOD PRICES THIS YEAR

Kenneth Day of the firm of Sgobel and Day departed yesterday for the north after a several days visit here looking over the fruit situation and discussing condition with the local representative of the firm, C. C. Lemmon.

Mr. Day said he had been in California for the past five weeks and that this was his seventeenth annual trip through the fruit districts. According to Mr. Day the outlook is bright for good prices and good market conditions. Last year was extremely bad due to shortage of cars, rail and coal strikes, local strikes in big business centers and unemployment throughout the country, said Mr. Day.

This year, according to the manager of the firm, the crop on the Sacramento river and in other Bartlett pear districts of California is light, due to blight conditions the year is the off year in the east and the demand for fruit will exceed the supply. The canneries are cleaned up on their stock of No. 1 pears and will have to pay \$65 to \$70 per ton next fall, in his opinion. Local conditions are good. The crop promises to be fairly heavy and the marketing conditions excellent, due to increased demand and buying power on the part of the people. All in all Mr. Day looks for a very favorable year.

NAT PLUNGE TO OPEN TOMORROW

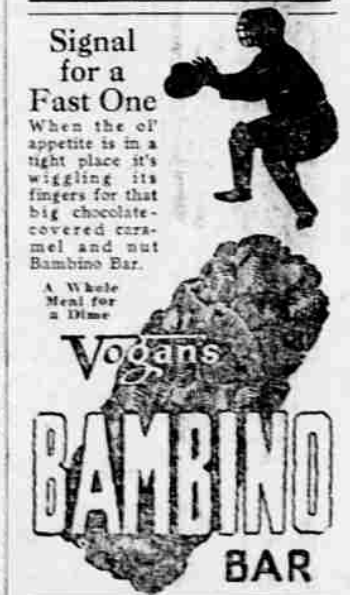

M'ADOO TO ATTEND MELLON'S UNVEILING

LOS ANGELES, May 11.—William G. McAdoo, former secretary of the treasury, has telegraphed to Andrew W. Mellon, secretary of the treasury, his acceptance of an invitation to attend the unveiling of a statue of Alexander Hamilton, their famous predecessor, at Washington, May 17.

The financing of the project was effected while Mr. McAdoo was secretary of the treasury in 1916, and completion delayed by the world war. This is the first monument to be erected to Alexander Hamilton in Washington," said Mr. McAdoo. "It is a tardy recognition of his great service to the nation. It is made possible through the generosity of a patriotic New York woman, who has never been willing to have her identity revealed."

James E. Fraser of New York was selected as the sculptor and the fine arts commission chose a site in the south plaza of the treasury.

Flugging Probe Ends

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., May 11.—The investigation by a joint legislative committee from the Florida leg-

islature of alleged cruelty to convicts in various private lease camps in the state was ended yesterday. Senator John P. Stokes, chairman of the committee, in a formal statement declared that the committee had gone the limit of its authority and could serve no further useful purpose.
