

PORTLAND STAR HERO OF CONNIE MACK'S COMEBACK

CHICAGO, May 11.—(By Associated Press.) Connie Mack's Philadelphia Athletics continue to furnish the early season sensation of major league baseball. Having made a good showing against eastern teams, they have caught a good stride in their first western invasion after losing the first contest, winning yesterday over the Sisler-less St. Louis aggregation in a slugfest match 10 to 7.

Sammy Hale, Connie Mack's \$50,000 beauty, purchased from the Portland club of the Coast league, got into a batting stride against the Browns' hurlers and cracked out three hits.

With the aid of the snow man in Detroit, who kept the Tigers and Washington idle, and the New York Yankees, who defeated Cleveland, 13 to 4, the Philadelphia went into third place, topping the Indians.

Everybody in the Yankee lineup hit at least once for a total of 19 safeties and 26 bases, and New York drew further away from the pack. Three Indian pitchers were batted out of the box.

Dick Reiche helped to bring college players into the limelight by crashing four hits, including a double and a triple for the Boston Americans, who lost to the Chicago White Sox at Chicago, 9 to 7. Reiche is from the University of Illinois.

Pat Moran's Cincinnati Reds treated Christy Mathewson's Boston Braves to another loss on their home lot, winning 4 to 3.

MAY EXTRADITE MUSICIAN FOR NASTY LETTERS

NEW YORK, May 11.—Officials of the state department may be asked to issue extradition papers for the return from Europe of George Maxwell, president of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers, under grand jury indictment on charges of forgery and sending scurrilous letters to Allan A. Ryan, financier and son of Thomas Fortune Ryan.

This was learned today following announcement of the indictment, returned last month which the authorities were said to have made every effort to keep secret. Mr. Ryan turned over to the authorities several typewritten letters, all but one of which were unsigned and which were said to have mentioned Maxwell and Mrs. Ryan.

The envelopes were addressed in handwriting resembling envelopes sent four years ago to several prominent men in this city, in each of which Maxwell's name was alleged to have been linked with that of the wife of the recipient.

Investigation of the charges contained in the letters of four years ago as well as those to Mr. Ryan was said to have proved them to be without foundation.

140 CASES OF BOOZE SEIZED, S. FRANCISCO
