

CANADIAN TOWN DEPOSITS \$10,000 FOR FIGHT TICKETS

SHELBY, Mont., May 11.—(By the Associated Press)—More than one million feet of lumber has been purchased and is now being shipped here for the construction of the arena where the Jack Dempsey-Tommy Gibbons heavyweight championship fight will take place July 4.

Carpenters already are at work on the structure and 200 more men will be on the job Monday, according to Mike Collins, one of the promoters of the match.

A fight fan from Swift Current, Canada today deposited \$10,000 for tickets for his town.

Sale of the pastebards has reached \$200,000, and according to Collins, they will be on sale throughout the country May 20.

NEW YORK, May 11.—The Great Falls National bank of Montana, it was learned today, has wired a deposit of \$100,000 to the Harriman National bank here for the account of Jack Dempsey as an initial payment on the \$300,000 which the world's heavyweight champion is to receive for his bout with Tom Gibbons in Shelby, Mont., July 4. The champion has deposited \$50,000 with the Harriman National bank as a forfeit in case the contract is not carried out.

TWO BOOZE RAIDS NEAR CENTRAL PT.

H. Tokos was fined \$500 and given a six month's jail sentence when he pleaded guilty yesterday afternoon before county Judge G. A. Gardner to a charge of illegally possessing intoxicating liquor. The jail sentence was suspended on assurance of good behavior.

Doremus is scheduled to appear before Judge G. A. Gardner tomorrow morning on a charge of unlawfully possessing intoxicating liquor.

FIRE DEPARTMENT IS CALLED TWICE

The fire department was called out twice yesterday, once in the late afternoon and again in the early evening, to quell minor fires, which however caused the usual excitement in the respective neighborhoods.

At 2:45 p. m. the department was summoned to the home of Chas. Swift, 1405 North Riverside, where fire from a stove had ignited the inside of a partition nearby and crawled up to the ceiling, causing much smoke. The residents and neighbors were excitedly working with a garden hose, pouring water all around and on the roof overhead when the fire department arrived.

The firemen hastily looked over the situation before pouring any water or chemical fluid, went upstairs, ripped up a board over the fire in the partition, seized the same garden hose which the amateur fire fighters had been working, turned it down onto the flames and extinguished them. The loss was about \$30.

At 7:35 p. m. the department was summoned to the home of J. W. Dressler, 247 North Holly street, because of a bad flue fire which was throwing out large flakes of burning soot. All danger was quickly past and the fire extinguished.

look me over as I passed along. "Completely surrounded by the villagers, I was able to make known my need of food. When they understood my signs they could not do enough for me. They bathed my sore feet and simultaneously offered me food, the while jabbering ceaselessly.

"These peasants truly were good Samaritans. When I had rested they took me to a larger town where there were some foreigners, and there I was provided with clothing. From there I reached the railroad and took the train to Tsinanfu."

TSINANFU, Shantung, May 11.—(By the Associated Press)—Dr. Heimberger of the Shantung Christian university has left for Lincheng, guaranteed safe conduct to the mountain strongholds of the Chinese bandits, where he will be conducted to the foreign captives who were taken from the Peking express train last Sunday.

All the captives were reported today to be alive, but some of them, including J. B. Powell, an American newspaperman, were said to be ill. Mr. Heimberger's mission was arranged by American Consul Schurman.

Miss Lucy Aldrich, sister-in-law of J. D. Rockefeller, Jr., now in a hospital at Peking where she was sent after the bandits released her, buried most of her jewelry not far from the scene of the holdup. Standard Oil company employees, carrying a man she drew, have gone to search for the spot.

Berlin, It was announced that no official action would be taken against Vorosky, particularly as the Swiss government was anxious to avoid endangering Swiss businessmen who went to Russia to reopen trade relations.

The police today declared they were not obliged to give special protection to Vorosky as he was not an official delegate to the conference, but that nevertheless, the chief of police only a few days ago visited him and asked him if he desired protection. This offer Vorosky declined. It is said. The police announce that besides finding newspaper pictures of Vorosky in Conrad's valise they also discovered a four page typewritten statement headed: "My confession," in which Conrad told why he intended to shoot Vorosky and added that he had planned to kill M. Teitelherin, the soviet foreign minister, during the first Lausanne conference, but found no opportunity.

"expected at any time," and that the bandits would be paid a ransom by the Chinese government.

Minister Schurman invited the serious attention of Governor Chi to further delay in case of the captives, adding that "one day might cause the death of a foreigner by starvation or shooting, and an international complication might be precipitated by one such death."

The American minister's report encouraged officials here to hope for early action for relief of those held prisoner, but it was said that efforts in their behalf would not be relaxed.

The state department again was in communication with the Chinese legation and Dr. Alfred See, the Chinese minister, who recently returned to his post after a long absence in China, had an engagement to see President Harding late in the day. His call was described as merely a courtesy visit, but it was taken for granted that the president would take occasion to reiterate that the American government looks to the authorities at Peking to hasten release of the captives.

Lasker's Successor Named.
WASHINGTON, May 11.—Appointment of Edward P. Farley of Chicago, former vice president of the emergency fleet corporation, to succeed Albert D. Lasker, as chairman of the shipping board, was announced yesterday at the White House.
