

NINE ENTRIES IN RACING MEET AT THE FAIR GROUNDS

Nine entries have been made to date in the 25-lap event of the racing meet which will be held June 15 and 16 at the local fair grounds, according to George Gates, racing manager. The entries are:

Other entries are expected from Klamath Falls, Yreka and Lakeview, although the meet is open to all cars in Southern Oregon and Northern California.

Five cars—Jewett, Essex, Hudson, Packard and Studebaker—have been entered by local dealers in a 10-lap event for stock cars which will be run both days of the meet. One prize of \$200 is offered to the winner.

An eight lap motorcycle race will be on the program each day with one prize of \$100. Entries in this event have come from Portland, Salem and Eugene.

Another stunt for dealers is an obstacle race between a Ford, Chevrolet, Star and Overland. The cars will run 150 yards between barrels, change rims in front of the grandstand and return the same distance between barrels, all against time. The purse is \$25.

A caterpillar has been purchased and will soon start to put the track in shape so that it will be ready by June 1 for tryouts. After the large track is completed, a half mile track will be constructed for horse racing at the county fair in September.

CARLSON KNOCKS OUT RITCHIE IN THE SECOND ROUND

The scheduled six round bout between Johnny Carlson of Gold Hill and Battling Ritchie of Grants Pass, which was held at Gold Hill last night ended in the second round when Carlson chopped Ritchie on the jaw with a short right and dropped him. Referee Bob Peterson of Iogue River was endeavoring to separate the fighters at the time and Carlson caught Ritchie with a choppy side-stroke which was neither hook, swing or jab. Ritchie was dead on his feet and the referee continued to try and "break" the boys and pushed Ritchie nearly out of the ring as he fell.

In the first round Ritchie caught Carlson with a neat left hook which knocked the Gold Hill prize to the canvas. Ritchie also scored a "throw down" in the first round, his mitts becoming entangled with Carlson and both contestants going to the mat, probably because of slippery canvas.

Some of the fans hooted when Carlson reached around the referee for the K. O. punch and others doubted the efficacy of the short blow and ridiculed Ritchie in the belief that he was lying down.

When Ritchie came to in his corner he claimed no foul and conceded the bout to Carlson.

The crowd which attended the bout was slim and most of the fans who paid their money to enter the Gold Hill Pavilion were not well satisfied with the early finish of the bout, which was interesting however as long as it lasted.

Round Ten.

Willard connected to the jaw with two straight rights. Johnson was wild and Willard took advantage of this to rest. Willard took a storm of rights and lefts to the jaw laughing and then as Johnson tired, he took the offensive. Johnson took more uppercuts and right hooks without quaking.

Round Eleven.

Johnson's head rocked from a right hook. He went down from a right uppercut. He was up at nine. Johnson fell to the floor from a right uppercut as the bell rang and was carried to his corner by his seconds. It was doubtful if he would be able to continue.

Firpo Beats McAuliffe.

RINGSIDE, May 12.—Louis Angel Firpo scored another spectacular ring victory today when he knocked out Jack McAuliffe, H. of Detroit, in the third round of their fifteen-round match, the second star bout of the milk fund carnival. Firpo ended the westerner's heavyweight aspirations with a terrific left to the jaw that sent him down for the full count shortly after the round had opened. McAuliffe came to alert quickly after an impressive start in the first round. Firpo seemed puzzled at first by his opponent's shifty style of boxing, but toward the end of the second round began to drive the Detroit boxer to cover with a rain of powerful rights and lefts.

McAuliffe went down at the close of the second round but was saved by the bell. Firpo rushed from his corner in the third round, intent upon making a quick finish. Brushing aside McAuliffe's futile defensive attempts he soon had his man groggy. McAuliffe took a short count and as he arose was met by a crashing right to the jaw. He went down for the last time.

Firpo was wildly acclaimed by the crowd and it was several minutes before a passage for him could be cleared through the throng that flocked the aisles.

Fulton Loses On Foul.

Harry Drake of London received the judges' decision over Joe McCann of Newark, N. J., in the first bout of four rounds. Drake punched McCann with a stiff left through all the rounds and evaded McCann's heavy swinging rights.

"Tiny" Jim Herman of Omaha, beat Al Reich of New York to the canvas in the sixth and last round of their bout. Herman staggered Reich with a left to the chin and then showered rights to the jaw. Reich attempted to arise at the count of nine, but was too weak and was counted out. He had cut Herman's left eye with a straight left in the fourth round and Herman was covered with blood. Reich weighed 204½ pounds and Herman 218½.

RINGSIDE, May 12.—Jack Renault of Chesham, Que., was awarded the contest with Fred Fulton, the Minnesotan in the fourth round of their ten-round match. The referee claimed Fulton had fouled Renault with a left swing. Renault had had the better of the fighting until the time the foul was committed.

GOLD HILL BANK EQUIPPED WITH BURGLAR ALARM

GOLD HILL, May 11.—(Special)—The Gold Hill bank in view of better protection, has had an electric alarm system installed by the Cannon Ball Alarm Co., of Minneapolis. All that the public can see of this alarm equipment is a metal box on the front of the building, as the heart of this ingenious system is inside the vault, and is connected with several other sensitive devices throughout the building, where a bank robber might try to force an entrance.

The alarm is attached to the protective devices throughout the system in such a way that the slightest interference at any point, by friend or foe, will cause the shrill siren to send forth its unusual warning, and cause the intruder to leave the premises as surely and quickly as if a volley of muskets exploded in the air.

No amount of ingenuity on the part of a robber will help him the slightest. The removal of even a single screw from the casing of the outside metal box will sound the alarm. A half-inch turn of the combination, cutting wires inside the bank, or in the basement, even application of heat to the vault door, in fact, any interference with the protective system of the bank at any point, will sound the alarm.

As the number of bank attacks increase, and more banks equip with modern electric alarms, it becomes evident that unprotected banks inherit all the risk of becoming victimized by yeggs. The officers of the local bank are to be congratulated in adopting this safety. An ounce of prevention is certainly worth a hundred pounds of cure in this case.
