USE SEA MINES TO THWART FRENCH

DUESSELDORF, May 14.—(By the Associated Press)—Floating mines, similar to those used by the Germans in the North sea during the war, are being brought into play in efforts to hinder coal and coke transportation from the Ruhr, it was announced today at French headquarters here.

At Ruhrort, one of the largest inland ports in the world, efforts were made to destroy the gates of the canal, which, if successful, would have drained the canal and the great Ruhr lock. The mine exploded prematurely and the damage was slight.
