LOS ANGELES TO BUILD STOCKADES FOR I. W. W. CROP

LOS ANGELES, May 15.—Continuance of the drive against alleged members of the Industrial Workers of the World, which resulted in the arrest of 346 men on charges of criminal syndicalism yesterday and last night was the forecast today by Chief of Police Louis D. Oaks.

"All idle men must explain their loafing and show they are not I. W. W. or go to jail," he said.

Most of the arrests were made in the harbor district, where a strike of the marine transport workers branch of the I. W. W. has been in progress since April 26, seriously hampering shipping.

When an attempt was made to hold a mass meeting in the harbor district in direct defiance of police orders, Chief Oaks called into action 300 policemen on duty in that section, and arrests were made literally by the wholesale. The prisoners were booked on charges of criminal syndicalism, held without bail and later transferred to a stockade at the Lincoln Heights station. There was no violence in connection with the arrests.

City officials conferred on plans for the construction at Griffith park of a large stockade, large enough to hold 1,000 prisoners and Chief Oaks planned to put 100 more policemen on duty at the harbor today.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 15.—The waterfront strike of the marine transport workers industrial union, I. W. W., was officially called off this morning at all ports on the Pacific coast except San Pedro, Cal., according to an announcement at I. W. W. headquarters here.

I. W. W. pickets disappeared from the waterfront yesterday and the striking marine workers have gone back to work.

According to James W. Crichton, local agent of the shipping board, no known members of the I. W. W. will be employed on shipping board vessels.

GREEKS AND TURKS REACH A DEADLOCK

LAUSANNE, May 15.—(By Associated Press.) The efforts of the allies at the Near East peace conference are being directed toward avoiding a possible break between Greece and Turkey over the question of reparations.

Former Premier Venizelos and M. Alexandris, the Greek foreign minister, had a lengthy conference yesterday with Ismet Pasha, head of the Turkish delegation. So far as appears, no grounds for a speedy and satisfactory solution were discovered. It is declared however that Greece's position was emphatically stated by M. Venizelos and that he warned Ismet that Greece, with her army strong and well equipped, would not stand for any payment of reparations over and above the sum which it might be adjudged was due Greece from Turkey.

COMMISSION APPEALS FROM COURT RULING

BOSTON, May 15.—The inter-state commerce commission appealed today from the recent ruling by the federal district court restraining inauguration of interchangeable mileage books at a twenty per cent reduction on fifty eastern railroads. The commission's order for the sale of the books now stands suspended until January on the railroads of the country.

BODY OF DEAD SOVIET ENVOY IS SENT HOME

LAUSANNE, May 15.—(By the Associated Press.)—The body of M. Vorovsky, the assassinated soviet emissary, left here for Moscow on a special car today. M. Ahrens, wounded by Vorovsky's assassin, insisted on accompanying the remains "as political protest." Ahrens was carried aboard the train on a stretcher and will be accompanied as far as Berlin by a Swiss nurse.
