

PHOTOGRAPHERS TO BE PROTECTED BY A NEW ORDINANCE

The city council last night had a busy session during which 14 ordinances, mostly of a routine nature, were passed including one changing the present fire limits in one or two minor features, as drawn by the city planning commission and which has heretofore been published.

Another new ordinance passed was one at the request of the local photographers which licenses all photographers doing business in Medford, both resident and visiting picture takers, and whose purpose is to protect the resident photographers from temporary outside and fly-by-night competition. Heavy penalties for violation are provided.

Among other routine ordinances passed were ones repealing water measures relating to water rules in accordance with all the water affairs of the city now being in the control and management of the city water commission.

City Attorney Carlin has long been busy at work calling out the useless and dead letter ordinances passed since the city government was founded, many of which are covered in similar ordinances on the books. A number of these ordinances are being repealed at every council meeting, any many others are to be repealed as Mr. Carlin finds time to call them out. It will be some time yet before this simplification and reduction of ordinances is completed.

E. M. Wilson, the accountant has just completed his audit of the financial affairs of the city for the past four years, an advance copy of which report was submitted to the city council last night by Mayor Gaddis. The report was referred to the finance committee of the council.

their part of the responsibility of maintaining the constitution and laws enacted in pursuance of it. The states are equipped with police organizations and judicial establishments adequate to deal with such problems. The federal government is not thus equipped.

"I venture that if by reason of refusal or failure of any state to discharge its proper duty in such connection, the federal government is at length compelled to enter upon the territory and jurisdiction of the state and set up those police and judicial authorities which would be required, the most difficult and trying situations would inevitably arise. More or less conflict between state and federal authorities would seem unavoidable in such circumstances. The impression would be created that the federal government was assuming to interfere with the functions of the states, and the distressing results that would ensue readily suggest themselves."

that won the friendship of Mr. Rockefeller, and a plan for harmonious operation of the Rockefeller and Gould railroad interests was arranged.

Next, Mr. Gould seized upon a circumstance which brought him close to Andrew Carnegie, who was engaged in a controversy with the Pennsylvania railroad at the time. The ironmaster offered Gould a liberal contract in exchange for bringing the Wabash road into Pittsburg on its way to the Atlantic coast, and through these concessions the railroad builder secured another powerful friend.

Showed Marked Ability

For two decades after the death of his father, George Gould continued to manage the vast properties, and many financiers and railroad men have declared that he frequently surpassed his famous mentor in his capacity to weave an indefinite jumble of railroads into a definite and complete system.

He was a director of the Denver and Rio Grande Railway company, the Rio Grande Southern railroad, the Utah Fuel company and of the Manhattan Railway company. During his career he had been president of the Little Rock and Fort Smith Railway; president and chairman of the board of directors of the Missouri Pacific railway; president of the Texas and Pacific railway; president of the St. Louis, Iron Mountain and Southern railway; president of the International and Great Northern railway; director of the Wabash railroad, and vice president of the Western Union Telegraph company.

Dissatisfaction among other of the heirs of Jay Gould over George's handling of the estate, however, had been growing for some time, and in July, 1919, he was removed as executor and trustee by a court order.

Mr. Gould's first marriage was in 1886 to Edith Kingdon, who dropped dead while playing golf on the Gould estate at Lakewood, N. J., in November, 1921. From this union there were five children.

Elopes With Actress

In May, 1922, Mr. Gould married Jeanne Sinclair, a former actress, 30 years his junior. The second marriage was regarded as almost as much of an elopement as the marriages of three of his children, Edith, George Jr., and Kingdon. The first news of it came from Paris, where the couple were spending their honeymoon, but it later transpired that the ceremony was performed in Lakewood. As a consequence of this marriage, Mr. Gould lost property valued at \$3,000,000 left by his first wife, which reverted to a trust fund for her children.

While Mr. Gould apparently enjoyed good health during the years he spent as a railroad builder, it developed during a lawsuit in 1923 that he had suffered a breakdown, and was spending most of his time in Europe recuperating from bronchial trouble.

In the spring of 1923 he became seriously ill while in Egypt, and was hurried back to his villa in southern France suffering from pneumonia. For several weeks his life was despaired of by the foremost physicians of Europe.

Mr. Gould's home in Lakewood, N. J., has been described as one of the most magnificent country places in America. It was modeled after the old English estates, and had its gatekeeper, its lodge, its master of the hounds and its master of the hunt.

The financier had been a lover of outdoor sports from boyhood, and continued to ride, hunt and play golf as long as his health would permit. He was a member of the New York Yacht club, the Atlantic Yacht club, the Royal Southampton and Royal Thames Yacht clubs, as well as the New York Athletic club and other national and international organizations.

BANDITS HURL THREE TO DEATH

PEKING, May 16.—(By the Associated Press.)—With the government's consent, Minister of Communications Wu Yu Lin and General Yang I-ten have proceeded to the stronghold of the bandits as hostages in order to obtain the release of the foreigners held captive.

Optimism Misplaced

TIEN TSIN, May 16.—(By the Associated Press.)—Reports from Lin-cheng yesterday said that optimism pointing to the immediate release of the foreign captives held by Chinese bandits was based on misplaced negotiations lasting three days and that a settlement was no nearer than at the start.

The delay was said to have been due largely to the fact that the brigands who seized the express train near Suchow were not acting independently but were members of an extensive organization which must be consulted.

Other factors may have entered into the situation but it is evident that the attitude of the bandits has stiffened. Dr. Martens has returned from the bandit headquarters with the statement that he was not allowed to visit the captives, some of whom were ill.

The bandits, it is stated at Lin-cheng resent the action of the Chinese soldiers in tightening the cordon drawn about the stronghold.

An official statement concerning Monday's conference said, "a tentative understanding" had been reached for the release of foreign and Chinese captives. It developed, however, that the bandits of southern Shantung, having an organization extending perhaps to other provinces and realizing the opportunity afforded by the capture of the foreigners to obtain concessions from the government, must be consulted as a whole before effecting a final settlement. Those guarding the foreign hostages said they could not commit all involved without a general expression of opinion.
