

CHAUTAUQUA TO OPEN IN ASHLAND THURSDAY, MAY 24

ASHLAND, May 16.—"The Shepherd of the Hills" is the masterpiece which will dominate Chautauqua attractions here this assembly season, the opening of the entertainment series to occur on Thursday, May 24. The customary drive for disposing of tickets began Tuesday morning this week, 24 teams of two members each having entered the canvassing field. The campaign is being made a lively and thorough one, not only the city, but suburban territory being distributed in three active preliminaries.

The Chautauqua assembly this year extends over a period of six days, from May 24 to 29, inclusive. Season tickets are only \$1.50, very reasonable considering the attractions available and when it is taken into consideration that admission to the premier entertainment of the course, "The Shepherd of the Hills," will be a dollar if purchased independently.

WORLD'S CHAMPION COW BANQUETED

AGASSIZ, B. C., May.—Led among rows of tables in a brilliantly lighted banquet hall and milked in the presence of 300 members of the British Dairymen's association here, Agassiz Segs May Echo, champion butter-producing cow of the world, was toasted in foaming glasses of her own milk here recently.

The famous cow was led into the banquet hall with a silver rope by a pretty milk maid. She showed no signs of embarrassment or fright when a storm of applause greeted her and quietly chewed her cud when, under the ministrations of her fair attendant, the streams of milk made bubbling music in a silver pail.

Agassiz Segs May Echo is a five-year-old Holstein bred and owned by the Canadian government's experimental farm near here. She recently established a record of 30,886 pounds of milk in 365 days, yielding 1681 pounds of butter. Her milk record has been beaten, but her butter record is far greater than any ever made before in the same period of time.

DENVER, Colo., May.—From January 1 to April 28 a total of 6,109 cars of lambs have been loaded in Colorado representing 1,455,000 head.

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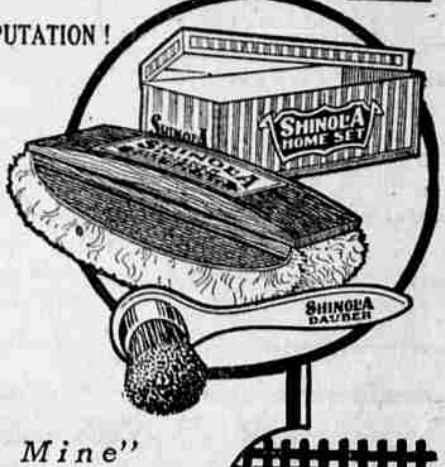
