

RITCHIE DIES OF INJURY RECEIVED GOLD HILL BOUT

GRANTE PASS, May 17.—Elmer Richardson died this morning at 1:15 at the family home on West G street, following an injury received on Friday night in a boxing match. Richardson fought Johnny Carlson of Gold Hill, at that place and received a blow which ruptured the intestines. Acute inflammation followed, with death occurring this morning.

Mr. Richardson was known among fight fans as "Batling" Ritchie, and for several years past has been appearing in the ring in Pacific coast towns. He belonged to the light-weight class and was considered to be a good fighter. His wife and child, who were living at his home in Lebanon, are expected to arrive in the city today. Funeral arrangements are to be made later.

JAP LINERS ENTER PACIFIC TRADE

TOKIO, May 17.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Japanese government is inquiring among foreign firms regarding equipment for four 20,000 ton liners to be allotted to Japanese ship lines competing with American and British companies on the Seattle and San Francisco runs.

According to present plans two of the proposed liners would be allocated to the Toyo Kisen Kaisha between Japan and San Francisco and the other two to the Nippon Yusen Kaisha between Japan and Seattle.

It is understood that the Nippon Yusen Kaisha is opposed to the government scheme and is inquiring on its own account for two such ships in England.

Shipping circles here presume that if the four vessels planned by the government are built they will be constructed in Japan.

BIBLE KNOWLEDGE HELD BASIS FOR PROPER TEACHING

SPOKANE, May 17.—Declaring that it is "ridiculous" that the bible cannot be read in the public schools of this state, N. D. Showalter, principal of the Cheney State normal school, told the Inland Empire Sunday school convention here today that "no one can teach properly without a knowledge of it."

Principal Showalter declared that because biblical allusions run through the literature of the day and that many of our laws are based on the bible, a knowledge of the scriptures is necessary to a well rounded education. He decried a lack of religious development among young people of today and said that "50 per cent of the pupils in our schools are without a concern for religion."

"If we will carry on, visualizing the nation of which he dreamed; if we will maintain the national viewpoint and emphasize the interdependence of all activities, interdependent, where none may permanently prosper without a prosperous whole; if we will inculcate the false cry of class where none need exist in the beckoning of American opportunity; if we will be as hopefully American as they were; if their immortal vision of the future will be secure. These must go, no matter what political sacrifices are made in the commitment."

troops. It is expected he will return to the bandit headquarters today in accordance with the promise he made on leaving.

SHANGHAI, May 17.—(By Associated Press.)—That the Suchow bandits will not kill their foreign captives but will hold them many weeks is the belief of General Ho Fung-Yu, Chinese military commander of the district in which the brigands' stronghold is located, according to direct advices received here today by the Associated Press.

General Ho's statement follows: "My troops had the bandits surrounded shortly after their raid on the Shanghai Peking express. If foreign officials had not interfered I would have told the outlaws if a single foreigner were injured I would cut off the heads of every one of the brigands

down to the last man of the thousands that compose their bands.

"They know me and they know I would keep my word. Consequently, I am sure they would have released their captives."

However, the foreign officials obliged me to withdraw my troops and the bandits have escaped back into the mountains whither it is almost impossible to follow them.

"They will not kill the captives but I believe they will hold them for many weeks."

SHANGHAI, May 17.—(By Associated Press.)—Confirmation was received here today of the previous report that the Suchow bandits had killed three of their Chinese prisoners by hurling them from a cliff in the Paotuku hills. The three men murdered, however, were not among those captured in the raid on the Shanghai Peking express May 6, but had been captured many weeks previously. They were killed, said the report from Shantung province because ransom promised for their release had not been paid.

It is also believed the bandit chief ordered their summary execution as a warning in the present situation involving the fifteen foreigners held by the brigands.

SHANGHAI, May 17.—(By the Associated Press.)—Dr. Jacob G. Schurman, American minister to China, who arrived here a few days ago from the bandit zone in Shantung province is returning to Peking today. Mr. Schurman attended to a number of official matters during his stay in Shanghai.

WASHINGTON, May 17.—The state department received today from Peking the text of a note delivered to the Chinese foreign office on May 16 by the diplomatic corps in Peking, reiterating that responsibility rests upon the Chinese government to obtain release of the foreign prisoners held by Chinese bandits and adding that the diplomatic corps "waits with impatience for it (the Chinese government) to take without further delay, efficacious measures for the liberation of prisoners."

The note added that the diplomatic corps "reserves the right to fix at a later date the nature and scope of the sanctions which the delay in the settlement of this deplorable affair entail, and which will be destined to prevent its recurrence."

State department officials refused to comment as to the probable character of the "sanctions" to which the note referred.

WASHINGTON, May 17.—A Peking dispatch to the state department today said that Consul John K. Davis and Major Philson, assistant military attaché at Lincheng had reported that the bandits had stated they were ready to negotiate with Chinese authorities for the release of the Americans and other foreigners recently captured. The message said a representative of the Chinese government would leave on the morning of May 17 to begin negotiations.

The message which was from Minister Schurman, said the terms of the brigands for release of the prisoners apparently had not been formulated as yet, but were understood to include the raising of the siege of Paotuku and the restoration of all the bandits to the Chinese army. Apparently no cash ransom, it was stated, had been demanded.
