CRATERS TO ATTEND C. OF C. LUNCHEON TO WOMAN'S CLUB

convention of the Oregon Federation

RUSSIAN DESERTER SEEKS LIBERTY

SEATTLE, May 17.—Argument
that Antoni Krachow, a native of
Russia, would have been guilty of
treason if he had not deserted from
the United States army when sent into
Siberia is the reliance of his attorney,
George P. Vanderveer, in a fight for
liberty. Krachow, who is serving a
twenty year sentence on McNeill
island for desertion, is to come be-
fore Judge Jeremiah Netter here on a
writ of habeas corpus.

Krachow had declared his inten-
tion of becoming a citizen of the
United States before he enlisted in
the army. After deserting in Siberia
he married a Russian girl and enter-
ed the Russian army. He was cap-
tured by American troops and sen-
tenced to death. The sentence was
commuted.

Vanderveer asserted that there was
not another case in the world war in
which an American soldier was asked
to fight against his native land.

MEXICO ASKED TO GUARANTEE OIL PROTECTION TO U. S.

MEXICO CITY, May 17.—(By the
Associated Press)—The recognition
commissioners of the United States
and Mexico met today to discuss
troublesome article 27 of the Mexi-
can constitution, the article that na-
tionalizes sub-soil minerals. The
United States is asking Mexico to
guarantee protection of petroleum
rights acquired by Americans before
the promulgation of the constitution
on May 1, 1917.

With the article formally before
the conference together with Mexi-
co's oft-repeated assertions that its
provisions are not retroactive, Presi-
dent Obregon's commissioners ex-
pected to be able to announce what as-
surances the administration was pre-
pared to offer in meeting Washin-
gton's request for positive guarantees.
This question, it is expected, will
furnish the first vital crisis in the ne-
gotiations.

RHODE ISLAND HEN MOTHERS KITTENS

HARRINGTON, Wash., May—P. B.
Davies of Harrington brings in a
brand new romance in the animal
kingdom.

He owns a pet mother cat and
knew there was to be an increase in
the feline family. One day recently,
the cat attracted Mr. Davies' atten-
tion, constantly meowing in a plain-
tive strain, like a broken-hearted
mother over the loss of her child.
Suspecting the truth, he made a dil-
igent search for some kittens, but it
was unavailing.

That evening while at the chicken
house gathering eggs, he approached
a nest which was occupied by a
Rhode Island hen. Attempting to
reach under "Biddy" for eggs, he
found three little kittens. The hen
remonstrated as violently about part-
ing with the kittens as though they
had come from shells. The triplet
kittens were famished, having been
under the hen for probably 24 hours
without nourishment.

So Mr. Davies concluded a com-
promise. He brought the kittens back
to the mother cat and gave the hen
the usual quota of eggs and cat, kit-
tens and hen all appeared to be satis-
fied.

SAAR VALLEY COAL STRIKE SETTLED

SAARBRUCKEN, May 17.—(By
the Associated Press)—The 50,000
coal miners in the Saar valley who
went on strike in January resumed
work today under an agreement pro-
viding increases in wages ranging
from three to five francs.

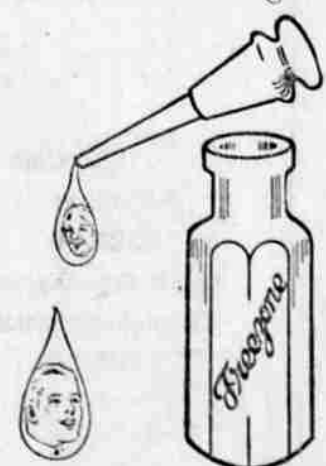
The strike was principally politi-

for the election.

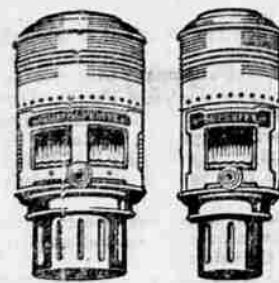
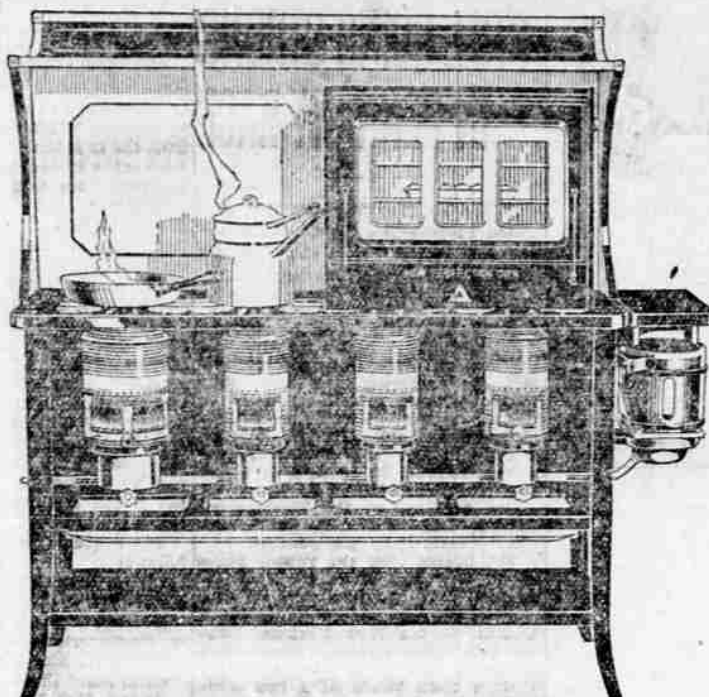
