MAY DISBAR CODD TRIAL DEFENSE

SPOKANE, May 18.—Arguments in the disbarment proceedings against Lester P. Edge, F. C. Robertson and George E. Crandell, defense counsel in the murder trial of Maurice Codd for murder here some months ago and defendants in the subsequent trial on charges of subornation of perjury, were concluded before the members of the grievance committee of the state bar association early this afternoon. The hearing was recessed until 3 p. m. when it was indicated that an important announcement might be made.

Prosecuting Attorney Charles Leavy and Assistant Attorney General M. H. Wright for the state demand disbarment of the respondents and F. C. Robertson, his nephew; Ed Robertson and George Turner and Frank Graves, argued for the defense.
