COLLECTING PINE CONES AT BUTTE F.

Fifty bushels of yellow pine cones have been collected in the Butte Falls district of the Crater National forest by local forest officers. The cones are being shipped to the Wind River nursery, which is conducted by the forest service at Carson, Wash., where the seed will be threshed out and planted. This amount of cones will make about 50 pounds of seed. In about three years the seedling trees will be shipped back for planting on Butte Peak, where an old burn resulting from a fire in 1910, is being restocked.

Experiments have proven that grass from seed collected in the vicinity where the planting is to be done grow much more successfully than those from seed collected elsewhere. Approximately 200 acres have already been successfully restocked on Butte Peak.

OWNER OF BEAVER RANCH IS SPEAKER BEFORE KIWANIS

At the Kiwanis club luncheon today in the Medford hotel, A. P. Smith, manager of the beaver farm near Brown's creek told of the plans of the company to produce beaver pelts for furs and the methods of catching and raising the beaver. He said they have a strip of land a mile long on Brown's creek fenced with Page wire and have 100 beaver in captivity, that the farm is located where the beaver have operated for many years, that beaver three years old produce good pelts, but they are at their best when five years old and bring about \$25 a pelt.

The speaker said beaver become domesticated very easily and make real pelts, are almost entirely free from disease and cost practically nothing

to raise as they feed entirely on vegetation found by themselves on the premises.

Blaine Klum who recently returned from a four months' trip abroad, accompanied by his wife and daughter, Lael, made a short talk on the different places of interest visited in France, England, Belgium, Holland, Italy and Germany, the customs of the people, told of the old ruins visited and the reclamation of the countries after the devastation by the war.
