

LARGE AUDIENCE ATTENDS REVIVAL CHRISTIAN CHURCH

The special evangelistic services began yesterday at the Christian church with large attendance and splendid interest. The morning sermon on "Spiritual Atmosphere" was for the purpose of showing that there are fundamental laws which govern spiritual life as well as natural life. Mr. Howe said, "There can be no life or growth if these laws are not observed. Every church creates an atmosphere not only on Sunday, but every day in the week, and this atmosphere is not always that which warms other hearts, and causes them to grow in the higher and better life. Some churches have been called 'cold storage houses' and it was not a misnomer. The church must have the 'sun of righteousness' and 'showers of refreshing' from the divine side, and it also must have the cultivation through love, sympathy, kindness and service, on the human side. There can be no harvest of souls filled with righteousness and fitted for eternity without the observance of spiritual laws found in the Word of God."

At the evening service in his sermon on "Why I am a Christian," Mr. Howe said, "There is every reason why a man should be a Christian, there is no reason why he should not be. If a person is a Christian he is fulfilling every relationship of life in the best possible way. He is right toward God, Christ, his neighbor, his family and the whole world. Just to say 'he was a Christian' is the highest tribute either in life or in death. A Christian has all of heaven's blessings now, and the crown of righteousness hereafter."

The ordinance of Christian baptism was administered at the close of the evening service. Tonight the subject will be, "The kind of revival the church needs," which will be of interest to all churches. The ministers of the city will attend the service. Mrs. Harry Seagull will sing, "For you I am praying."

More Missions and Doctors Needed in Japan Quake Zone

DES MOINES, Ia., Oct. 29.—A plea for still more missions, schools and doctors was made by Mrs. Charles Spaeth, recording secretary of the Women's Foreign Missionary society of the Methodist Episcopal church in convention here today. A ten percent increase in giving is required to cope with the situation in Japan created by the earthquake, Mrs. Spaeth declared.

Outlining the growth of the society the secretary said the present membership was 618,000 and that it had raised \$1,225,740 for foreign missions in the last three years.

Thirty-five missionaries were commissioned for service in nine foreign countries yesterday. Sunday evening service commemorating the 54th anniversary of the society was addressed by the Rev. Titus M. Lowe of New York City.

AMERICAN BOAT AGAIN DEFEATED IN HALIFAX RACE

HALIFAX, Oct. 29.—Blue Nose, the Canadian entry, won the first of the series of races for the north Atlantic fishermen's championship today defeating the United States entry, Columbia, over a 28 mile course.

The finishing times: Blue Nose 1:43:42; Columbia 1:45:02.

HALIFAX, Oct. 29.—The Gloucester schooner Columbia and the Nova Scotia schooner Blue Nose today started the first of the races for the championship of the North Atlantic fishing fleets. The Blue Nose crossed the starting line thirty seconds in the lead.

The starting times were: Blue Nose 9:01:20; Columbia 9:01:50. Both schooners had all sails set. The start was in a breeze of about sixteen to twenty knots with occasional showers.

The course consists of six miles straight out of Halifax harbor and about 34 miles in a triangular course. The time limit will be six hours.

At the first mark, six miles out the Blue Nose was one minute, sixteen seconds ahead; at the twelve mile mark this lead was increased to two minutes, seventeen seconds.

The Columbia had taken the lead when the vessels rounded the third mark, 21 miles from the start. She made the turn ten seconds ahead of the Blue Nose.

2 DYING AS RESULT OF LOVERS' QUARREL

DAVENPORT, Ia., Oct. 29.—Dependency over the loss of his position as manager of a large estate at Moline, Ill., led George Brumbaugh to fatally shoot his fiancée Miss Mary Thulin, early today and then attempt to take his own life, according to a note found in his pocket. Physicians reported his condition serious.

The young woman, a nurse to whom Brumbaugh was to have been married next Saturday, died shortly before noon.

SENATOR STANFIELD IS SPEAKER AT PENDLETON

PENDLETON, Ore., Oct. 29.—The meeting of the Umatilla Rapids Power association is called for ten o'clock this morning in this city and notables from all over the northwest have signified their intention of being present at the meeting. Among those who are scheduled to speak are Congressman Summers of Washington, and Sinnott of Oregon, and Senator Stanfield of Oregon. The meeting is called by Judge G. W. Phelps of Pendleton, president, to push forward plans for the project which when completed will affect 75,000 acres.

TOWN LOT OIL WELLS SCORED BY INT. DEPT.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—At least 30,000 acres must be allowed for each well drilled on government lands, under a ruling promulgated today by the interior department. The order was based upon a recent survey of the industry by the bureau of mines which concluded that "what is known as town lots have been responsible for great waste of oil and large monetary losses to investors."

CAN PASS BONUS BILL AND REDUCE TAXES SAYS CURTIS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—Congress could reduce taxes at the forthcoming session, even though soldier bonus legislation is enacted, Senator Curtis of Kansas, republican whip of the senate and member of the finance committee said today after a call at the White House. He added that he expected bonus legislation to be passed.

The difficulty in passing a bill to reduce taxes, Senator Curtis said, would be in obtaining agreement by the various groups in congress on a reduction program. Unless such a program can be agreed to, he said, nothing probably would be done.

"There is a strong demand for the country over for a reduction in taxes," the senator said. "It is the duty of congress to take steps to further wipe out the war levies. Something was done along that line by the last congress in reducing the tax burden by approximately \$800,000,000. Something more should be done by congress at the forthcoming session."

The Kansas senator said he personally would favor a reduction all along the line, differing with Senator Smoot of Utah, who will be chairman of the finance committee in the next senate and who advocates the elimination of taxes on persons of small incomes. Senator Curtis said he was not prepared to take a stand with Secretary Mellon for a reduction by one-half in the present surtax rate of fifty percent.

In asserting that taxes could be reduced even though a bonus bill were passed Senator Curtis explained that his statement was contingent upon the expectation that the bonus bill would be along the line passed by the last congress and vetoed by President Harding. Such a bill would involve an expenditure of about \$75,000,000 the first year.

EUGENE MEYER, JR. EXPLAINS WHY THE PROGRESS IS SLOW

DENVER, Colo., Oct. 29.—Although there is a growing "appreciation everywhere of the fact that the co-operative marketing movement offers at the present time more promise of helpful results along sound lines than any other program that has been suggested," two elements are opposing the cooperative marketing movement in the principal wheat growing states of the west, Eugene Meyer, Jr., managing director of the west finance corporation, said here today after visiting the wheat states of the west at the request of President Coolidge.

"In our travels through the wheat states we have found that the cooperative movement is encountering opposition from two sources," Mr. Meyer declared in a statement made public by his assistant. "On the one hand it is being attacked by some of the grain dealers who find themselves unable to see that the present method of marketing grain is anything less than the acme of perfection. On the other hand, certain elements are belittling the movement because it interferes with their program of virtual socialization of these groups, however, the movement is receiving substantial and effective support."

Five contenders will meet Hoppe—Schaefer, Erich Hagenbacher, the German champion; Welker Cochran, young American player; Roger Conti, champion of France; and Edouard Horemans of Belgium.

Hoppe will open the play with Hagenbacher. The tournament consists of fifteen games, a round robin of matches at 500 points each, continuing to November 5.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 29.—Refineries today announced a reduction of twenty cents per hundred pounds in the basic price of refined cane and beet sugar, effective at once.

The new base price for refined cane sugar is \$9 and for refined beet sugar \$8.80.
