

GERMAN SOLDIERS ARREST DEPUTIES SAXON PARLIAMENT

LONDON, Oct. 29.—German soldiers today entered the Saxon parliament building in Dresden and arrested a number of communists, some of whom were members of the diet and other leaders of the communist party, says a Central News dispatch from Berlin.

Another dispatch says the members of the Saxon cabinet submitted to their dismissal by the central government only under protest.

LONDON, Oct. 29.—A note from the government of the reich dismissing the cabinet of Saxony from office was handed to the cabinet today and the members of the ministry submitted to the dismissal by the central government only under protest.

LONDON, Oct. 29.—General Von Mueller, commander of the reichswehr, has prohibited the assembly of Saxony from sitting tomorrow, says a Central News dispatch from Berlin this afternoon. This action prevents the members from taking any measures under the protection of the parliament immunity act.

BERLIN, Oct. 29.—Herr Schultz, former premier of the Saxon chancellery, has been appointed reichs commissioner for Saxony says the Lokal Anzeiger. The appointment was made in consequence of the Saxon ministry's decision to disregard Chancellor Stresemann's ultimatum demanding his resignation.

BERLIN, Oct. 29.—Rioting at Freiberg, Saxony, on Saturday when demonstrators attacked a battalion of federal troops resulted in 13 rioters being killed today. The first report gave thirteen killed and a score wounded.

Snow in Nebraska.
NORFOLK, Neb., Oct. 29.—A general snow storm is in progress in northern Nebraska and southern South Dakota this morning. About five inches of snow is on the ground at Winner, S. D., and about half an inch in northern Nebraska.

STATE FEDERATION OF LABOR MEETS ASTORIA, OREGON

ASTORIA, Ore., Oct. 29.—The State Federation of Labor annual convention assembled here today with President Otto Hartwig in the chair and about eighty delegates in attendance. Mayor O. B. Stotters of Astoria formally extended a welcome and President Hartwig responded. W. H. Fitzgerald, representing State Labor Commissioner Gram, addressed the convention. Committees were named before noon adjournment. The executive committee is to report this afternoon.

Mr. Hartwig in a statement said that one of the most important subjects to come before the convention will be in relation to the state workmen's compensation law. A proposal will be laid before the convention, he said, looking to endorsement by the federation of an amendment to the law to make acceptance of its provisions compulsory on the part of employers. At the present the law provides that any employer or any group of workmen may accept or reject them.

Governor Pierce will be a speaker before the convention.

NEW BANK STARTED UP, SALEM, OREGON

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 29.—The Oregon Trust and Savings bank is the name of a new bank to be located here, articles for which have been approved by the state banking department. The incorporators are George P. Rodgers, Joseph H. Albert and T. A. Livesley, all connected with the First National but it was said the two institutions would be competitive. The First National was recently formed through a reorganization of the Capital National bank.

DUESSELDORF.—An agreement was reported between the French economic authorities and the Krupp officials for the continuation of operations of the Krupp plant and the delivery of reparation coal to the allies.

GIRL CHARGED WITH MURDER, FIRST DEGREE

PENDLETON, Ore., Oct. 29.—A charge of murder in the first degree was formally lodged against Miss Nora Ellis for the alleged killing of Gordon Mettles of Ukiah near Albee on Saturday, when the young woman was arraigned in the court of Justice Joe H. Parks at eleven o'clock this morning, the hour being advanced from two o'clock. Miss Ellis maintained a calm, unruffled appearance in the court room this morning.

PENDLETON, Ore., Oct. 29.—Miss Nora Ellis, confessed murderer of Gordon Mettles, Ukiah rancher, will be arraigned in the justice court here today at two o'clock according to Sheriff Zoeth Houser of Umatilla county. A coroner's verdict returned in the case gave a verdict that Gordon Mettles, stage driver of Ukiah, "came to his death as a result of gunshot wounds inflicted by a unidentified person, but probably at the hands of Nora Ellis of the Lazy Z ranch."

The funeral of Mettles, who was well known throughout this county, will be held in this city this morning.

CHARLES R. FORBES ATTENDS SENATE BUREAU HEARING

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—Charles R. Forbes, formerly director of the veterans bureau, against whom charges of debauchery and corruption in connection with contracts with bureau hospitals were made last week by Elias H. Mortimer of Philadelphia, was present today at the resumption of hearings before the senate investigating committee.

He was accompanied by his counsel, James S. Easley-Smith. There has been no decision as to when Mr. Forbes will take the stand, but it was indicated that he probably will not do so until Major General John F. O'Ryan, general counsel for the committee, has concluded the presentation of all evidence he has relating to Mr. Forbes' administration as director.

REVOLVER STOLEN AT EADS 2ND HAND STORE

The Eads Brothers Second Hand store on South Fir street was entered sometime Sunday night, by removing a window pane in the rear, and as far as has been discovered nothing was taken by the robbers, except a .45 automatic revolver belonging to George Eads. A thorough search of the place was made for money. It is thought the crime was committed by boys or a small statured man.

PUT BIRD PRESERVE NEAR ROOSEVELT'S GRAVE

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—(By the Associated Press.) Eleven and a half acres of wild land which surrounds the grave of Theodore Roosevelt at Oyster Bay have been purchased by his cousin, W. Emlin Roosevelt, New York capitalist, and presented to the National Association of Audubon societies for a wild bird sanctuary and shrine for bird lovers. It was announced today by T. Gilbert Pearson, president of the association.

Sinclair said that while he could not recall the exact time and circumstances Mr. Fall had dinner with him on several occasions and had been his guest on his private car. He added that other cabinet officers also had made trips with him, but he denied in reply to an inquiry from Senator Walsh, that Attorney General Daugherty had been his guest on his private car at the Kentucky races.

In replying to further questions he said he had contributed to both the republican and democratic national campaign funds last year, but could not recall the amount of either contribution. He had not assisted in collecting any money for the republican campaign committee, he said, in addition to the amount he had himself contributed. Mr. Sinclair added that "Mr. Thompson, who was chairman of the finance committee of the republican national committee," was a stockholder in his company and a director until about two years ago.

SAYS BOOTLEGGERS AND BREWERS ARE IN A CONSPIRACY

SPOKANE, Oct. 29.—That "a widespread conspiracy between rum runners and bootleggers in Washington and brewers and distillers in Canada" is slowing down prohibition enforcement in this state was the declaration made here today by Joseph Pope of Seattle, superintendent for Washington of the Anti-Saloon league.

There is comparatively little rum running in eastern Washington, Mr. Pope said, and the center of the largest bootleg activities of the state is in the Grays Harbor district. He said Roy Lyle, federal prohibition director for Washington, is "ardently devoted" to enforcement of the prohibition laws, and expressed the opinion that with the addition of an attorney to the staff of the league and extension of the co-operation given the federal, state and city officers, the "widespread lawlessness" which he charged existed on the coast can be stamped out in time.

CREW RESCUED AFTER 9 DAYS WITHOUT WATER

MANILA, Oct. 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—After drifting for nine days in an open boat without food or water, four survivors of a crew of nine of the coastwise sailing vessel "Doctor Ilcoso Sur" were picked up today by the British steamer Eurylochus, seventy miles north of Luzon. The Doctor Ilcoso Sur went to the aid of a lumber boat bound for Manila from Cagayan on October 20 and foundered after it had been only a few hours out. The crew members were all Filipinos.

See Paris-London Accord
PARIS, Oct. 29.—(By Associated Press.) The French official circles today indicated their expectation that a final accord with the British government regarding the conditions under which the proposed committee of experts will examine Germany's capacity to pay will be reached within a day or two and that the reparations commission may go ahead with the arrangements before the week end.

It is anticipated here that the experts will be invited to assemble in Paris at the commission's headquarters. The commission will decide at its meeting tomorrow whether the German delegates will be heard on the situation of their country as they recently petitioned.

Little Change in Ruhr
DUESSELDORF, Oct. 29.—(By the Associated Press.) The situation in the Ruhr and Rhineland both politically and economically gave little evidence today of movement either way. No notable activities either by the separatists or unemployed were reported overnight. Though the general progressive outlook was expected to begin today no reports had been received up to midday of actual closings of factories or mines.

No information was available from official quarters as to what progress, if any, was being made concerning the agreements reached with the great industrial interests. Confirmation from these sources as to the reported agreement with the Krupp interests was still lacking, although it was unofficially admitted that the agreement was as good as completed. German observers in Duesseldorf said today they had good reason to believe the separatists had postponed the carrying out of their plans for occupation.
