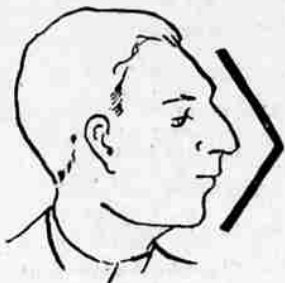

MEN AND WOMEN
GOLD SEEKERS IN
ALASKA WRECKED

SEATTLE, Oct. 30.—A party of men, women and children led on a gold seeking expedition by A. H. Moore of Los Angeles, is returning on the steamer Buford, their craft, the sailing schooner Fred B. Wood, having been wrecked. It was indicated by delayed dispatches received here today from Nome, Alaska.

The Wood, which arrived August 27 at Teller on Port Clarence Bay, 75 miles northwest of Nome carrying 109 men, women and children who had left San Francisco in her was wrecked September 23, when a terrific storm swept Bering sea, advices related. The Wood was reported as going ashore in Port Clarence. The Buford, whose destination is San Francisco, left Nome Sunday midnight and is due here November 4.

The Moore expedition, which left San Francisco July 6, was declared the most unusual that had ever approached the far north in the search for mineral wealth.

The Wood was equipped with radio sets, photographs and games. She carried a cow, some sheep and horses and other livestock. She had an airplane and an automobile for such jaunts as might be found possible in the north.

Mr. Moore declared that the expedition was strictly a business one. He said that he and his associates were going to Nome to work properties controlled by the Eldorado Development company. Among the possessions of the company he listed more than 50 miles of ditches near Nome.

LLOYD GEORGE IS
ALLOWED TO SIT
IN HONORED CHAIR

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 30.—The official welcome to ex-Premier Lloyd George took place on City Hall plaza today where Mayor Hampton Moore gave the visitor the freedom of the city.

As the band played "America," Mr. Lloyd George turned to the mayor and said that a Welshman composed the last three bars of the music and for that reason he smilingly added, he felt that he was somewhat of an American himself.

At Independence hall, to which the British statesman and his party was driven through crowded lanes of people waving American and British flags. Mr. Lloyd George was invited to sit in the chair occupied by John Hancock when he presided over the meeting at which the declaration of independence was signed and also occupied by George Washington when he presided over the constitutional convention. Dame Margaret and Miss Megan were similarly invited.

The former British premier looked at the chair for a long time and turning to the assemblage in the declaration room, said:

"It is indeed a high honor you are conferring upon me by giving me the distinction of sitting in the chair occupied by one of the great men of the world during one of the great occasions which had a profound effect upon my country and which altered the whole course of human history."

David Lloyd George studied the Liberty Bell intently, reading its inscriptions as it hung in its glass case in the corridor of the historic building. On his way from Independence Hall to the Academy of Music where he was scheduled to address the Philadelphia forum, he was enthusiastically greeted by thousands.

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The supreme council for the Ancient and Accepted Scottish of Freemasonry for the southern jurisdiction of the United States, at their biennial session held in Washington, D. C., during the week of October 15th to 20th granted a charter to Siskiyou Lodge of Perfection of this city. This lodge which is composed of the 4th to the 14th degrees inclusive have been working under a dispensation since last May.

A charter is usually not granted until a lodge has been working for some time and made a good showing. This speaks very well for the members of this body in southern Oregon.

On November 23 and 24 a reunion will be held in Medford for the conferring of the 4th to the 32nd degrees inclusive. Representatives of the higher bodies in Eugene will come from that city to confer the 15th to the 32nd degrees, and it is expected that visitors and candidates from Lakeview on the east to Eugene on the north will be present at that time.

BERLIN, Oct. 30.—(By the Associated Press.)—The German cabinet headed by Chancellor Stresemann is likely to fall tomorrow, it is stated in well informed quarters, through the withdrawal of the socialist ministers in protest against the government's policy toward the former communist socialist cabinet in Saxony.

VOTED DOWN AT
ROTARY LUNCHEON

At the regular weekly luncheon of the Medford Rotary club today a secret ballot was taken on the question of a state income tax which will be voted on by the people next Tuesday and resulted in 17 votes against the measure and four for. No remarks were made either in favor or against the measure, the vote merely being taken on the motion of H. L. Walther.
