U. S. BANKER SAILS TO HOLD RUHR MEETING

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—Wills H. Booth, president of the international chamber of commerce and vice president of the Guaranty Trust company, sailed today on the Mauretania for Paris to arrange for a conference of delegates from 28 nations to make recommendations regarding the proposed reparations discussion advocated by Secretary of State Hughes.

Mr. Booth was hesitant in discussing the Paris session which begins November 12 but it was reported his hurried trip concerned selection of the committee of financial experts who, under the Hughes plan would pass on the amount that Germany might be expected to pay.

"I think it will be a very important session," was all Mr. Booth would say of the Paris conference.

Americans Are Becoming Nation Of Butter Eaters

OMAHA, Oct. 30.—The consumption of butter in the United States has increased 160,000,000 pounds in the last twelve months, according to Dean H. L. Russell of the college of agriculture of the University of Wisconsin.

"The production has shown an increase of 100,000,000 in a year to meet the rising demand," Dean Russell said, "but the country has been compelled to import 60,000,000 pounds of butter during the year to make up the difference between the increased demand and increased supply—despite the fact that the Fordney bill places a high duty of eight cents a pound on butter."

Agricultural experts, Mr. Russell asserted, are unable to explain the big increase in butter consumption.

The fifth anniversary of the ending of the World war will be celebrated in Medford Monday, November 12 with a program which will take up virtually the entire day. Beginning at ten o'clock in the morning with the formal dedication and public inspection of Medford's new \$80,000 armory the events scheduled also include the annual Armistice day gridiron struggle between Ashland and Medford high schools, an automobile speed carnival on the Jackson County Fair grounds speedway and in the evening the American Legion Armistice day ball.

All the features have been so arranged as to avoid conflict in time and it will be possible to enjoy all of the attractions and still have time to acquire a bite to eat when hunger calls.

Commander C. Y. Tengwald of the local American Legion post, appointed a committee some time ago to work out a program for the fitting celebration of the day most dear to the hearts of the veterans and as reports come in from the various committee workers it appears certain that Medford will be the Mecca for one of the largest Armistice day crowds ever assembled here.

And it was a thriller—or to be strictly accurate a stunner. And the village cynic must remember this—it takes a lot to startle the ladies nowadays.

Lisbon Govt. Near the Edge.
LISBON, Oct. 30.—A resolution of confidence in the government was carried in the chamber of deputies today by the narrow margin of 43 to 42. Later the premier went into conference with President Gomez.

PRUNE GROWERS IN WALLA WALLA ARE INDIGNANT

WALLA AWALLA, Wash., Oct. 30.—The prune growers of the Walla Walla valley, incensed over the returns they have received for this year's crop, held a mass meeting at College Place, near here last night to hear the report of their special investigating committee named at a previous mass meeting to examine the state of affairs of the co-operative association which handled the crop. Because all the returns on sales have not yet been received but the directors agreed to endeavor to submit a report shortly. W. R. Parvin, who handled the crop it was reported, is ill in Kansas City and a representative of the association has been sent there to assist in closing up the affairs of the association. The growers expressed great disappointment over the probable returns, but most of them favored a continuation of the plan of co-operative marketing. They stated that under-selling by other communities not in the co-operative movement, caused the slump in prices.

CHARGE OFFICIALS WITH LOOTING OF EMERICH OIL CO.

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—Charged with looting the treasury of the Emerich Oil company of Delaware with offices here and in Wichita Falls, Tex., three officials of the company are facing eight indictments for grand larceny. Testimony by former Governor Charles N. Haskell of Oklahoma formed the basis on which some of the indictments were returned.

John F. Emerich, former president of the company, who is in Los Angeles, Edward J. Duverson, vice-president, and J. Ben Ross, Los Angeles, a director are accused in the indictments of stealing at various times almost \$100,000 from the company. George T. Vickers, who succeeded Emerich as president of the company, charged there were indications that stockholders had been defrauded of other sums.

WHEAT FIELDS CANADA MAKE A NEW RECORD

WINNIPEG, Manitoba.—The total wheat crop of the Canadian provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta is estimated by government officials at 425,503,169 bushels, an increase of 50,000 bushels over the record 1922 yield. The three provinces now produce approximately 95 per cent of all wheat grown in the Dominion, officials said.

Forty-five and 50 bushel yields were reported in a number of areas while in others the run was 60 bushels to the acre. The wheat weighed between 63 and 67 pounds to the bushel and more than 90 per cent of it graded No. 1 hard.

The oats yield in the prairies was placed at 286,825,295 bushels. Other grain crops were estimated as follows: Barley, 61,540,140 bushels; rye, 24,376,560 bushels and flax 7,193,025 pounds.

ELECTRIC R. R.'S COMING BACK IS BANKER'S CLAIM

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—Discussion of subjects treated in committee reports, including safeguards for public utility bonds, irrigated and foreign securities and the electric railway situation occupied delegates at today's session of the annual convention of the Investment Bankers' association of America.

James W. Welsh of New York, secretary of the American Electric Railway association told the bankers that "electric railways have come back." He declared government figures showed that 117 car rides were sold in 1922 for each inhabitant of the United States as compared with 109 in 1917 and 100 in 1912, "put aside the fear," that "competition from the motor vehicle, either in the form of the common carrier, the bus, the jitney, or private automobile is at the expense of the electric railways."

The average fare throughout the country now, he said, was 7.3 cents, a recession of one-fifth of a cent since 1921, while the operating ratio last year was seven per cent less than in 1920. A decline in track mileage since 1917, he added, has been more than offset by increased supplemental bus service, while it was estimated that \$250,000,000 would be spent this year for improvements as compared with \$150,000,000 in 1921. More than 80,000 street cars are in operation, he said, 13,000 new cars having been purchased in the last five years.

"Fixed prices, special taxes and imposts, paying charges, labor demands, strikes, rising costs and in many cases, unrestricted competition have had their way," declared Mr. Welsh, "but the cars keep running."

Supreme Court Meets, Pendleton.
PENDLETON, Ore., Oct. 30.—The supreme court of Oregon is in session here trying a number of cases appealed from the circuit court. All the justices are present with the exception of Judge Burnett. The session which began yesterday will be continued today and possibly tomorrow.

Era Meeker Improving.
SEATTLE, Oct. 30.—Era Meeker of Seattle, blazer of the Oregon trail, who is almost 93 years old, was today reported much improved in an attack of illness that seized him October 19. Mr. Meeker had a restless night and fever was much allayed, it was stated.

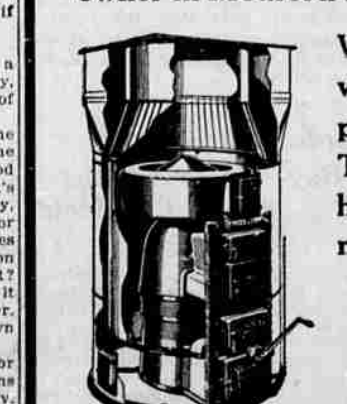

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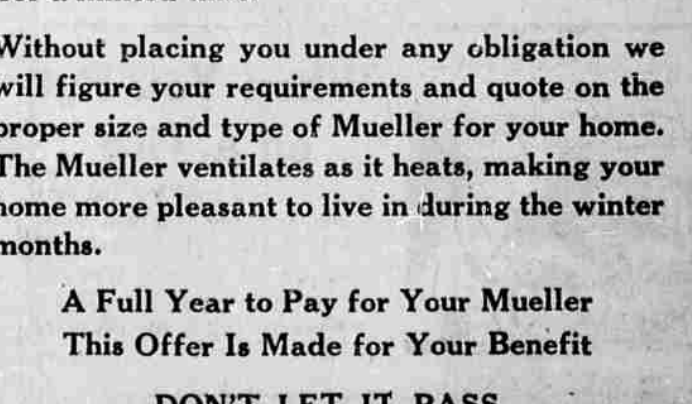
