GEOLOGISTS GIVE EXPERT OPINIONS ON TEAPOT DOME

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—Views of other geological experts on the state of the oil deposits in the Teapot Dome naval reserve when it was leased to the Sinclair interests last year were sought by the senate public lands committee today in continuing its investigation of the lease. Experts who examined this property for the committee reported these deposits greatly depleted by drainage and that in their opinion development was the only means of preventing greater loss to the government.

Intensive drilling of wells along the boundary between Teapot Dome naval reserve and the Salt Creek oil fields would shut off drainage from the reserve into the Salt Creek field, K. C. Heard, geologist in charge of the oil and gas sections of the geological survey, told the committee. If the policy of the government was to retain in the ground the supply of oil in the Teapot Dome reserve there was not, in the opinion of the witness any reason for the leasing of the entire reserve.

In reply to word from the committee Mr. Heard said the secretary of the interior had not consulted him about drainage of the reserve, but that he had made a report on the subject which had been submitted to the secretary.

Complications made by him led him to believe, he said, that the drainage without effort on the part of the government to use offset wells, would have resulted in the loss of less than one-ninth of the oil in the reserve. He asserted that before a greater loss occurred, the oil displaced by drainage would have been replaced by a water barrier which would have prevented further loss.

With intensive drilling along the boundary of the reserve adjoining Salt Creek fields Mr. Heard said, the reserve would have been effectively closed to drainage in that direction in three years. The total loss of oil during the period, he said, would not have exceeded one million barrels.

MAN'S FINGER IS GRAFTED ON NOSE, WORKS PERFECTLY

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Oct.—The successful grafting of a new nose onto the face of a human being has been made possible by the wonders and triumph of modern surgery. It was demonstrated here recently when the operation was performed on Thomas Kilcullen at Sydney hospital.

Kilcullen lost his nose through an operation. Surgeons expressed the belief that they could graft a nose to his face, using the middle finger of his left hand for the missing organ. The delicate and painful operation took two weeks. The finger, still attached to Kilcullen's hand, was bound closely to his face, after the skin had been prepared to make the grafting possible. His left hand and arm were bandaged so that they could not be moved and in that position Kilcullen remained until the graft was completed, when the finger was severed from the hand.

The surgeons said that Kilcullen will be able to breathe through the transplanted finger and will even be able to blow it. They could not guarantee that it would serve as an organ with which Kilcullen could distinguish various odors.

COUNTY HELD LIABLE FOR BRIDGE DISASTER

OLYMPIA, Wash., Oct. 30.—Mrs. Kate M. Harr has sufficient cause to maintain an action against Cowlitz county for alleged negligence in connection with the collapse of the Kelso bridge across the Cowlitz river last January. Superior Judge Reynolds dismissed the action against the county on the grounds that the bridge was entirely within the city limits of Kelso and was without the jurisdiction of the county but the supreme court today held that the county's maintenance and the operation of the bridge for the past ten years constituted liability.

Santa Barbara Boy Declared the Model Boy Scout

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—Andrew Blake, fourteen of Santa Barbara, Cal., represents the typical American Boy Scout in an oil painting by Albert Boyer, American artist, which has been presented to Sir Robert Baden-Powell, founder of the Boy Scouts.

Blake, who is an eagle scout, the highest rank obtainable in scouting, was chosen, Mr. Boyer said today, for "his most neat appearance, his character and his youthful beauty."

The gift is the first of a series of paintings which will depict the typical scout of every nation and which will be hung in the London headquarters of Sir Baden-Powell.

SMITHSONIAN IS A BIT SCEPTICAL OF LATEST FIND

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—(By the Associated Press)—The Smithsonian Institute is not yet prepared to accept the theory of J. P. Harrington, one of its scientific investigators that he has found near Santa Barbara, Cal., the bones of a pre-Neanderthal man.

Although for the most part reserved in their comment, officials of the institution and other Washington scientists make no secret of their reluctance to accept the California discovery as epoch making until a careful study of them has been made. In order that there may be no unnecessary delay, the institution today has ordered an examination to be made in New York before a group of the country's greatest anthropologists.

Dr. Jesse Fewkes, director of the bureau of ethnology of the institution, said he regarded it as extremely improbable that pre-Neanderthal man had left traces in California, although he did not care to cast discredit upon Mr. Harrington's claim until its authenticity had been passed upon by competent experts.

A similar opinion was expressed by Dr. Alex Hrdlicka, curator of the national museum. He asserted that there was little possibility of primitive man ever having inhabited the region of Santa Barbara.

GERMAN CHIDES U. S. IN PREFACE OF DICTIONARY

LEIPZIG.—Germany never ceases to disclaim loudly all responsibility for the beginning of the great war. In the theatre, in the pulpit, in the press and in the political forum Germany proclaims her innocence with an insistence which never seems to wane.

Foreigners are much impressed by the unanimity with which Germans of all classes take the same text and preach the same homily. The arguments hob up in most unexpected connections. But it remained for F. W. Elzen, the editor of a new commercial English-German dictionary, which has just been issued in Leipzig, to find the most unique medium for a lecture to members of the entente. The preface of this book, designed primarily for sale to English-speaking persons, opens:

"As long as the statement of the entente pretend to believe in Germany's 'guilt' they are not likely to consider a revision of the Versailles treaty (it may be ended); and as long as this dictate—the most cruel, cowardly, and silly crime ever perpetrated—in 'not revised,' all talk about, and thought of reconstruction, normal business relations, and all that sort of thing is of course, so much nonsense. No fear Americans will ever receive their word of honor pledged by President Wilson; but some day or other and somehow or other, there will be a revision (no man in his senses can doubt it) and Germany, once more, will come to the fore. Until then honest business men will have to muddle on, I suppose, doing 'business as usual.'"

MIDDLE AGED GOLFERS SCORN DOCTOR'S WARNING

CLEVELAND.—The warning of London physicians that persons 50 years old or more are endangering their lives by playing golf is scoffed at by Cleveland's "Indian Scouts" foursome, believed to be one of the oldest active quartets in the world, who may be seen regularly on the golf links here. Their combined age is 227 years. None of them started playing golf until he was past the half century mark.

The foursome is composed of Chas. W. Burrows, 74; G. T. McIntosh, 75; J. W. Webb, 69, and A. W. Neale, 59. All are prominent business men here and may be seen on the links "every Saturday and a couple of three times a week," as one of them put it.

When they are "on their game" the foursome play in the low eighties or nineties. They have been playing together for about 12 years.

"I don't know of any pastime more pleasant, more healthful and more invigorating for a man between the ages of 60 and 80," Mr. Burrows said. "Of course a man who allows his muscles to become soft and flabby from lack of exercise, smoking, over-eating and drinking and then goes out on the course and overtaxes his strength is in danger, but moderate golf means health for a man past 50 who keeps himself in condition."

Hoppe, the defending champion, stepped out in front in last night's victory over Erich Hagenlacher of Germany in the first match of the world's 15.2 ball line billiard championship tournament, his victory was not impressive and his followers will watch his further appearance with anxiety.

Hoppe won from Hagenlacher 500 to 424, but it took him 26 innings to do it, the match requiring three hours and 45 minutes to play and taking a place as one of the slowest championship games on record.

Two close matches are expected today when Welker Cochran, United States meets Roger Conti, France, in the afternoon and Jake Schaefer and Edouard Horemans of Belgium come together in the night match.

MILWAUKEE.—Thly (Kid) Herman, California welterweight, knocked out Jack Schoendorf of Milwaukee in the third round of a scheduled ten round match.

CHICAGO.—Morrie Schalefer of Omaha knocked out Patsy Rocco of East Chicago in the fifth round of their scheduled ten round bout at East Chicago.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—Leland Stanford university has been awarded the national A. A. U. junior water polo championship for 1923 by John Taylor, chairman of the A. A. U. swimming committee. The contest will be held in the Leland Stanford pool, California, the latter part of next month. Eight Pacific coast water polo teams have already signified their intention of competing.

OREGON 'U' PREPARES FOR STANFORD GAME

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 30.—Word has been received from Jack Benefield, graduate manager of athletics at the University of Oregon that a forty-piece band and 600 students will be in Portland early on the eve of the Stanford-Oregon football game to be played here November 10 to stage a rousing celebration which will include a "pop" rally in the gymnasium of the Multnomah club and reach a climax in a serpentine parade through the heart of the business section.
