## HUGO STINNES, JR., TO PASS THRU MEDFORD

SEATTLE, Oct. 31.—Hugo Stinnes, Jr., son of Germany's industrial magnate, and his wife will arrive here on a business mission next week according to information received by his local representative.

Stinnes arrived in New York City from Germany last Saturday. The present itinerary plans, it was understood here today, call for a brief stop in Chicago and then to Seattle. From here he is expected to go to attend the Pacific coast foreign trade convention at San Francisco via Portland and then to Argentina where the Stinnes company is reported to have recently purchased a large fleet of tank steamers to enter into competition with an American oil company.

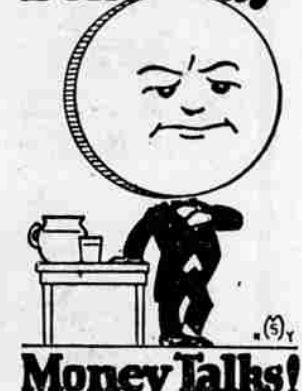

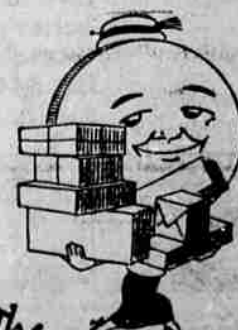
