THIS IS A STUDEBAKER YEAR

ASHLAND GAS IS IN STRONG DEMAND BY BUTTER MAKERS

ASHLAND, Oct. 30.—The demand for carbonic gas which is shipped from the Pompadour Lithia Springs, has materially increased very recently as a result of the discovery that butter churned in an atmosphere of this gas is much purer and keeps better. One dairy in Oregon is now charging their butter this way and have proved that the resulting product is not only purer and sweeter, but that it will keep excellently until used and will not deteriorate in the package. During the past two years, experimenting has been carried on at the dehydrating plants of the Kings Products Company which has resulted in the perfection of a method for packing their dried food products in an atmosphere of the carbonic gas, which is by far superior to the old method and will be used in the future. Owing to the purity of the gas made at the Pompadour Lithia Springs, large quantities are being shipped frequently to these two concerns as they are obtaining the entire amount of that used from this place.

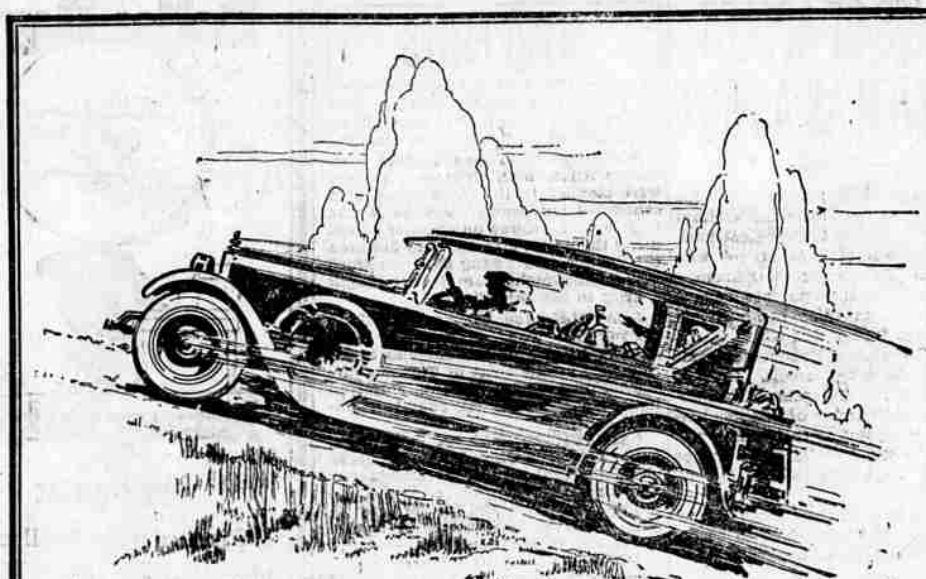
