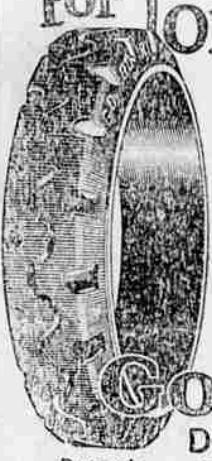

DEALER FOR OLDS SIX ANNOUNCED

Great interest is being shown in automotive circles by the latest announcement of the General Motors Corporation of the "lowest priced six cylinder car ever built in America." The General Motors Corporation have decided to market this car under the Oldsmobile name and are therefore discontinuing the Oldsmobile four and eight-cylinder cars, and will make hereafter only the new light six, to be known as the Oldsmobile Model 30. The car is manufactured complete by the General Motors, who have just completed enlarging the Oldsmobile factory to bring it up to a capacity of twelve hundred cars a day.

The new six embodies such well known assemblies as Delco starting and lighting system, Zenith carburetor, Borg and Beck clutch, Fisher bodies on both the open and closed type and the car is equipped with a small bore long stroke "L" head motor, Thermoid universal, selective three-speed transmission and semi-floating rear axle. The differential can be removed thru a rear inspection plate without disturbing the rest of the car. With a wheelbase of 110 inches and extra long springs, it is heralded by the Olds Motor Works as the easiest riding car they have ever produced. Critics of the automotive world have already predicted that the new Oldsmobile light six will very shortly be one of the largest produced cars on the market. Local Cannery to Pack Food Products

The Rogue River Valley Canning Co., is employing about 75 people and is now canning pears, pumpkins and making cider. After they have canned the vegetables and fruits Mr. Bullis says they will pack food products with meat and vegetable contents. Thousands of dollars are spent for this grade of canned goods by Medford and southern Oregon people and as the valley produces the raw materials why not manufacture the finished product.

Mr. Bullis says the quality of fruits, vegetables and berries packed this year is far above the average and the only trouble has been to get enough products to can and the labor to do the work.

FARMER GETS \$4.65 FOR WHEAT, COSTS CONSUMER \$22

DENVER, Oct. 31.—Computed upon present prices, the consumer pays \$22 for the amount of bread one barrel of flour will make, while the producer receives only \$4.65 for the wheat used in that amount of flour. Dr. C. J. Smith of Portland, Ore., representing Governor Pierce of Oregon at the wheat conference here told the delegates in an address today.

Dr. Smith charged the Association of Bakers with monopolizing the flour buying field, maintaining a system by which the retail bread dealer, the wheat producer and the consumer get little or no benefit.

"The bakers' association today buys eighty per cent of the flour manufactured," said Dr. Smith.

"Under such an agreement, it seems to me conditions are such that the farmers could be guaranteed \$2 a bushel for this wheat without anyone suffering and without effect on the consumer's pocketbook."

Governor William E. Sweet of Colorado took exception to a warning to the convention yesterday by Eugene Meyer, Jr., managing director of the war finance corporation, to "keep your organization free of partisan politics."

"Certainly I would say," the governor declared, "we'll keep our organization out of politics if the other fellow will. I've found that we pass nothing in this country—prohibition or tariff—until we make it a political issue and fight it out before the people."

J. B. Musselman, representing wheat growers of Saskatchewan declared he did not believe Canada and the United States could form a marketing combination to govern the price of export wheat as long as the American growers admit they face the prospect of selling the surplus wheat for export at less than production cost and when Canada remains dependent on 80 per cent of export to dispose of its wheat crop.

Mr. Musselman said he favored centralized control of marketing and warehouses rather than the pooling of wheat.
