ADJ. GEN'L. WHITE HERE TO PURCHASE ARMORY EQUIPMENT

Adjutant General George A. White is in Medford making a final inspection of the local armory preliminary to accepting the building for the state. With him is John Hunzicker of Eugene, architect for the building. Both expressed themselves as well pleased with the work done by the local contractor, R. I. Stuart, and said that Medford is getting more than a dollar's worth of building for every dollar expended.

Arrangements are also being completed by General White for the equipment of the building for which there is a balance of over \$4000 available. All furnishings and equipment will be purchased in the local market he announced, and bids and estimates are being secured today from Medford firms by Captain H. A. Canaday, commander of the local National Guard company.

As soon as the building has been accepted and fully equipped the formal dedication will occur and Captain Canaday and his officers are planning to make the dedication a county affair, ending with a military ball to which the entire county will be invited. No admission charge will be made for the ball. November 26 has been fixed as a tentative date for the dedication, contingent upon the equipment and furnishings being in place by that date.

Sports CHAMPION CUE ARTIST BEATEN BY W. COCHRAN

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—Welker Cochran, youthful Los Angeles cue expert, who last night provided the greatest surprise in the world's 15.2 ball line billiard tournament by defeating Title Holder William F. Hoppe, is matched with Erich Hagenlacher, German champion, in the Hotel Pennsylvania this afternoon. Jake Schaefer of San Francisco and Roger Conti of France also are matched for the afternoon and Hoppe will meet Edouard Horosman tonight. Nothing so brilliant was expected of the Californian, the youngest American player in the tournament, as in the 1922 tournament he won but one match, defeating Hagenlacher. He won from Hoppe, 500 points to 230. In this victory Cochran made the highest run of the week, 146, and in finishing in 16 innings, set up the best average 21.4-15. Hoppe was far off his usual game.

JACKSON COUNTY GETS \$10,638.48 ON TIMBER SALES

Jackson county's share of the \$168,111.95 funds from the sale of timber, rentals, etc., on the forest reserves in the state, is \$10,638.48, according to figures compiled by the secretary of state. Payment will be made at once.

Under the law governing the payment of the money, it shall be used only for school and road purposes, 75 per cent to the road fund, and 25 per cent to the school fund. The part going to the road fund, may be used in the payment of outstanding road bonds, or to be put in a sinking fund.

Klamath county received \$12,679.92 from the fund, and Josephine county \$2,545.81.

Only counties of the state in which federal forest reserves are located benefit from the distribution.
