Portland exporters are observing apple week in a fitting way by dispatching heavy shipments of fresh apples to the United Kingdom and continent in refrigeration. The Blue Star liner Albatross, with approximately 60,000 boxes of apples on board, was due to sail at 4 p. m. for the United Kingdom. The Holland American liner Nictor was due this afternoon at Terminal No. 4 to load a cargo of approximately 100,000 boxes of fresh apples for United Kingdom and European ports. She is due to sail early next week. The motorship Lochgolf, of the Royal Mail line, is due November 12 to load a large parcel of apples for United Kingdom ports.—Portland Journal.
