OCTOBER RAINFALL HEAVIEST IN THE PAST NINE YEARS

The outstanding feature of the last month's weather was the unusual amount of its rainfall, which was two inches and the largest rainfall here since the year 1914 during which the fall amounted to 2.12 inches.

Not only was the rainfall of last month unusually heavy for recent years, but it was well scattered throughout the month, so much so that it seriously interfered with the picking and harvesting of fruit, especially of the apple crop. "In my memory the rain of October made it one of the hardest months for the picking of fruit," says County Agent C. C. Cate.

There were 19 days in which there was .01 or more of an inch of rain. Only eight days of the month were clear, and 22 were cloudy and 1 partly cloudy. The greatest rainfall in any 24 hours was .86 of an inch on the 6th.

There were several foggy days, three frosts, but no killing frost. The temperatures for the month were as follows:

Mean maximum, 65.19; mean minimum, 40.09; mean, 52.64; maximum, 85 on the 1st; minimum 28 on the 24th; greatest daily range, 43.

STEPHEN MATHER PAYS TRIBUTE TO E. O. McCORMICK

The late E. O. McCormick, vice president of the Southern Pacific company, was the greatest friend and most consistent booster of Crater national park in the railroad world, and one of its best friends outside," said Stephen G. Mather, director of national parks, while in the city today.

"I had personally known him ever since I became head of the national parks, and regarded him as one of my best friends. "I would have liked to remain in this city much longer and had intended to do so, but his unexpected death in San Francisco prevented, as at the request of his widow I will act as one of the pall bearers at the funeral in St. Mary's church tomorrow in San Francisco, and Mrs. Mather and I leave for that city on this afternoon's train."

KLAMATH RANCHER FOUND MURDERED

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Nov. 2.—Fred Skeen, a young rancher residing near Dorris, just over the California line, south of Klamath Falls, was found dead in his bed by a neighboring rancher yesterday under circumstances indicating murder. The Siskiyou county sheriff notified Sheriff Lowe of Klamath county that he was seeking a man named Steward who had been employed by Skeen and another, known as Blackie, in connection with the case.

Following the crime the slayers stole Skeen's automobile and three shotguns and are believed to have driven toward Lakeview or Burns, the Siskiyou sheriff said.

ENGLAND ARRANGES IRISH CONFERENCE

LONDON, Nov. 2.—(By the Associated Press)—The British government has issued formal invitations to the free state and Ulster governments to appoint delegates to meet British government representatives in conference for an attempt to adjust the Ulster free state boundary question. Both governments have accepted, but owing to the meeting of the imperial conference it has not yet been possible to fix the date for the first meeting of the boundary conference.
