

MEDFORD HIGH TO MEET KLAMATH HERE SATURDAY

Saturday afternoon the Red and Black of Medford will line up against the Red and White of Klamath Falls, in one of the hardest games the home team has as yet fought. Coach Carlsson of the Falls is bringing 16 players in anticipation of a tough battle.

The Medford eleven will round out their week of diligent work by a light practice this evening. Coach Carlsson, while he makes no predictions, feels confident that his men will give the best that is in them. The wearers of the red and black will go onto the field fully determined to win, but knowing they are facing a team as good as they are. Carlsson will have all the first and second string men in suits.

The following will start the game: Glascock, center; Pruitt and Park, guards; Maddox and Dressler, tackles; Perry and Singler, ends; Neff, full; Williams and Daly, halves; Fabric, quarter.

The Klamath team will stay at the Medford Hotel. A large banquet has been arranged for the teams tomorrow night as a form of entertainment in return for the fine time the Medford team was shown at the Falls last year.

The game will be called at 2:30 at the Holly street grounds.

PORTLAND MEN TO CUT HUGE TRACT VICTORIA TIMBER

SEATTLE, Nov. 2.—Plans for the cutting off of from 800,000,000 to one billion feet of timber on Vancouver Island, opposite the west coast of British Columbia and the building of new lumber and wood pulp and sulphite mills at Edmonds have been announced by Henry W. Kent of Portland, Ore., and B. A. Strawbridge of Seattle, officials of two investment companies.

"The timber adjacent to Quatsino Sound is owned by Portland, Ore., interests," Kent said, "covering 27 sections. It is proposed to bond the timber, utilizing the money to erect a mill at Quatsino Sound which will export the squared lumber to a finishing plant at Edmonds. Options have been taken on eleven acres of land at Edmonds."

"A third development will be a pulp and paper mill, designed to use waste products from the Edmonds mill and also waste from other lumber mills on Puget Sound."

GETS TO PORTLAND BUT DOESN'T KNOW HOW

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 2.—M. E. Bley, of Freeport, Ill., found himself here Monday morning and had no recollection of leaving home or how he got here, according to his statement to the police, whom he consulted after receiving a telegram from his wife.

gress would see much needed financial legislation passed. An appropriation of \$2,500,000 would be asked for maintenance and road work in the parks.

The heavy attendance at Yellowstone park this year was cited as an example of national park roads. Yellowstone was the first park to have a road system within its boundaries, and was a mecca for 138,000 motorists last summer.

Superintendent Mather praised the cooperative spirit shown by Medford in making Crater lake what it is today.

True to their reputation the Craters put on an entertainment full of pep and go. The Lannapach-Alford orchestra gave a marvelous musical program.—Herb Alford with his musical saw, taking the crowd by storm,—while Jerry Jerome sang a series of topical songs, full of clever lines directed toward Mr. Mather, Alex Sparrow and Col. C. G. Thomson. There was a large crowd present and the luncheon was up to Dinty Mohr's usual standard, which is saying as much as could be said.

Director Mather's assistant, Arnold B. Cammerer, was also a guest of honor and gave very interesting statistics on the growth of attendance in the national parks. He also said the best booster club in the United States is the Medford Crater club.

One of the important events of the luncheon was the report of A. J. Crose who turned in \$3000 worth of notes given by Medford business men to insure the new Medford Armory, and in behalf of the National Guard he offered the Armory for the use of the Craters at any time without charge.

A burlesque that made a great hit was put on by Capt. Vance, who represented the U. S. Budget Committee, and Postmaster Bill Warner, who represented Mr. Cammerer. Vern Vawter also figured in an excellent stunt in which he represented Col. Thomson, J. T. Buchter representing Alex Sparrow and his classic Elizabethan English.

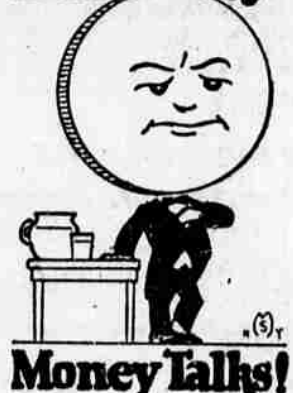

Wire Report On Foreign Money

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—Demand sterling dropped nearly two cents to \$4.46, a new low record for the year, at the opening of today's foreign exchange market. Weakness of the British exchange resulted, it was stated, from speculative pessimism over reports from Washington that the United States would refuse to participate in the proposed reparations conference if Premier Poincare of France insists on limiting the scope of the inquiry.
